SUTTON STORY PICTURESQUE

Superstition Prevented Him Trying Out New Gun After Breaking Mirror

General "Lucky" Sutton, former aide of Chang Tso Lin, northern China War Lord, and one of the most picturesque of the post-war crop of soldiers of fortune, is superstitious, says W. B. De Graves in the Edmonton Bulletin.

It cropped out on Sunday when the General, who is now in Edmonton, was recounting how he happened to get in with the Chinese generalissimo, and finally to command a division in the Northern army.

The General, who is by way of being a munitions expert, offered to make Stokes guns for Chang Tso Lin and show his soldiers how to handle them. Chang Tso Lin agreed, and placed a small arsenal at the disposal of the Englishman, who, in course of time, finished a gun. They agreed to have a demonstration, one Sunday morning, and the Chinese marshal lined the streets out to the testing ground with soldiers, invited all his staff to see the demonstration, and paraded about 40,000 men to be on the grounds to see the new weapon. The demonstration was set for 10 o'clock, and at about 9.45 Sutton was shaving and turning round suddenly, knocked down his mirror, cracking it clean across the centre. That settled it. The shoot was off.

Vainly the chief-of-staff threatened and cajoled. Sutton would not budge. He was told that Chang Tso Lin would have him shot. Still he wouldn't leave the hotel, and the result was that the troops were dismissed, the six-mile route to the testing grounds left unguarded, and the mighty Chang Tso Lin himself with all his glittering staff had to return home.

Next morning Sutton put on the shoot. It proved entirely satisfactory, and he disposed of the gun secrets to Chang Tso Lin for \$250,000 and at the same time agreed to make more of them and train the troops.

"But if I'd have gone out the morning the mirror cracked I'd probably have been blown up or something. I just had to quit that day after breaking the mirror; it was too unlucky," he said.

Boats going up on the Ward Ways recently for cleaning painting and minor repairs have included the hall-busters R.W. W.T., Cape Spear, Bingo, Verna and Gibson, packer Spindrift, cruisers Myfahwy, Edac and Laura F., and trollers Glide, Mary G. and Iceland.

Harry Landry has been engaged this week in an audit of the books of the Prince Rupert Boat House.

Except for a few fender piles alongside the fish houses which will be put in after the commencement of the close season, the Pacific Stevedoring Co. has now completed the contract of rebuilding the government wharf and has removed its paraphernalia from the scene. Order has come out of chaos and the wharf looks better than it ever was before.

Two nice halibut boat building jobs have been awarded during the week to Japanese yards in Cow Bay.

Anton Moen, this season a member of the crew of the schooner Cape Beale, has given to Y. Suehiro the contract for the construction of a 45 foot vessel with a 30 h.p. Prisco-Standard engine.

To K. T. Summira, on the opposite side of the bay, has been given by Marelius Holkestad, late of the Viking, the order for a 40 foot boat, of similar design to that of Moen, with 25 h.p. Bollinder motor.

The entire construction of both boats, except the engines, will be carried out locally. They are both scheduled for delivery by the end of January and will be received acquisitions to the Prince Rupert fleet as well as tributes to the enterprise of their owners.

Word brought to port during the week indicate that most encouraging results have within the past few days been obtained in the dog fishing operations being carried out under the auspices of the Rupert Marine Products Co., Ltd. which is using the fish for reduction purposes in its Tucks Inlet plant. Prospecting operations carried on since the first of the month have resulted in the location of some favorable fields that are now being fished and, whereas reports last week were not very rosy, later developments have made prospects much brighter and it is now confidently anticipated that the industry, during the coming winter, will afford profitable employment not only for trawlers and the like but also for the smaller gurdy halibut vessels.

Since a start was made, the Rupert Marine Products has moved its fish gathering scow no less than five times and it is now located in a sheltered cove on the northeast corner of Dolphin Island at the head of Schooner Passage where, during the past few days, some very substantial catches have been landed. Productive grounds have been found in the vicinity of Kitkatla Islands and Beaver Passage and on Monday of this week the five boats operating took 3,812 pounds, following up with 17,630 pounds on Tuesday. One boat took 4,515 pounds and others 3,900, 4,800, 2,800 and 1,700 pounds or an average of some two tons to the boat on the latter day.

Arrangements have been also made for the handling of varieties other than dogfish which are taken in the course of the operations. For such edible fish as cod, bass, etc., 2 1/2 c is being paid while for the sake of the 5c has been established for halibut. Free transportation to port is given and the ice for packing down is also supplied. Gasoline is being sold to the fishermen on the grounds at 2 3/4 c per gallon and the company is also providing bait in the form of frozen oolachan without cost in the meantime. The price being paid for the dogfish is \$7.50 per ton.

So far there are only two Japanese engaged in the dog fishing. The remainder are white.
