Vancouver Advises Thornton That Yards Here Are Fully Adequate to Construct Boats

VANCOUVER, April 13 .- That the building of vessels for the new service to be inaugurated between Canada and the West Indies by the Canadian National Steamships under trade agreement should be divided proportionately between Atlantic and Pacific shippards is the recommendation contained in a resolution passed by the Vancouver Board of Trade which has been forwarded to Sir Henry Thornton.

"Canadian Government Merchant Marine facilities on this coast," says the motion, "have in the past proven themselves eminently equipped to construct tomage and, in view of the present business done on the Pacific Coast by the government lines and the great future developments, we strongly urge that full cognizance be taken of the Pacific in awarding the contracts."
