DISTRICT PRESBYTERY HAS MEETING IN CITY

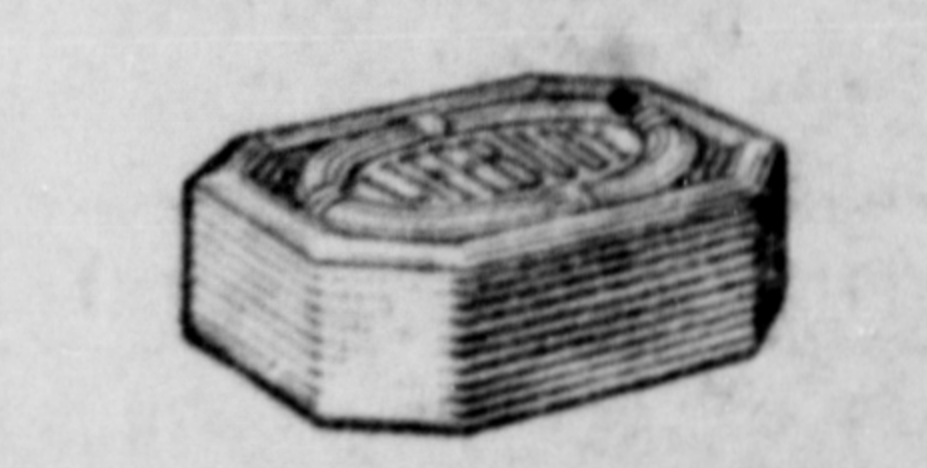
