TWO GRAIN SHIPS ARRIVE IN PORT

IMPERIAL VALLEY 'QUAKE --- MILLIONS DOLLARS DAMAGE

Ryoka Maru Comes in from Orient; British Ship is Due Tonight

The Ocean Transport Co.'s freighter, Ryoka Maru, arrived in port at 10 o'clock this morning from Darien, Japan, to load the first cargo of grain for the Orient that has been shipped from Prince Rupert. The vessel, which was met at Triple Island and piloted in by Capt. Larry Thomson, passed customs and quarantine inspection, and moved into the dry dock pier for lining. She will take her berth at the elevator about Thursday to start loading her cargo which will be destined for Shanghai.

TOOK LIFE OF HIMSELF AND HIS CHILDREN

MURDER AND SUICIDE OF ARTHUR CHILSTROM MAKES FOURTH CASE OF ITS KIND IN LOS ANGELES RECENTLY

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 3.—Arthur Chilstrom, aged 32, painter and contractor and formerly United States army aviator, committed suicide on Sunday and, simultaneously, took the lives of his two children at his home in a suburb. The bodies were discovered by Chilstrom's wife.

It was the fourth case in recent weeks here where parents had taken their children with them in committing suicide.

FISHERIES CASE IS INTERESTING

FEDERAL DEPARTMENT CLAIM AGAINST JOHN BUSSANICH BEING TAKEN TO APPEAL COURT

Interest attaches itself to the case of Rex vs. John Bussanich which is being taken to the Court of Appeals by the Department of Marine and Fisheries which has already suffered reverses in police court and County Court on the case. The Dominion seized some \$9,000 worth of salmon which had been mired cured by Bussanich and claims that he should pay a license fee for curing it. Bussanich's defence is that no license fee is required.

Counsel in the case, which will be heard in Supreme Court in Victoria, are L. W. Patmore for the department and Milton Gonzalez for Bussanich.

FORT WILLIAM CAR ACCIDENT

ONE WOMAN IS KILLED AND TWO ARE FATALLY INJURED WHEN AUTOMOBILE HITS FREIGHT TRAIN

FORT WILLIAM, Jan. 3.—Miss B. Cotter of Fort William and Mrs. M. Mellon of Port Arthur are dead, and Miss Susan Lyon is fatally injured as a result of an automobile accident early yesterday morning when a car driven by O. J. Parker, a Port Arthur man, ran into the side of a freight train. Parker was only slightly hurt.

YOUNG MAN GASSED IN VICTORIA CITY

Pan of Milk Boils Over, Extinguishing Flame and Causing Death by Fumes

VICTORIA, Jan. 3.—A young man about twenty-three years of age known only by the name of Lawrence was found dead on Saturday in a room which he had rented two weeks ago on his arrival here. He had been overcome by gas fumes as a pan of milk on a gas stove had boiled over and extinguished the flame.

Explosion Wrecks Crocker National Bank and Shakes 'Frisco Financial District

SAN FRANCISCO, January 3.—An illuminating gas explosion in the Crocker First National Bank on Saturday night shook the financial district of the city. The superstructure and lower floors of the Crocker Bank building were destroyed and windows were shattered in buildings as far distant as two blocks, the Sutter Hotel, two blocks away, having three hundred windows smashed. A few pedestrians were thrown down by the concussion and two watchman were cut by flying glass.

FALLING ROCK CAUSES DEATH

LANDSLIDE ON KETTLE VALLEY RAILROAD IN COQUAHALLA KILLS ONE MAN AND SERIOUSLY INJURES ANOTHER

HOPE, Jan. 3.—T. Komura, Japanese, was killed; Frank Fazzolare, 28, was seriously injured and three other, all members of a section gang, sustained minor hurts on Saturday when they were struck by falling rocks five miles east of here in a canyon in the Coquahalla Valley where they were clearing away a rock slide which had blocked the trains of the Kettle Valley Railway.

With his head cut open, Komura died on the train between here and Vancouver where he was to have been placed in hospital.

Fazzolare was taken to a hospital in Vancouver where, with all the ribs on one side of his body broken, his condition was reported to be critical.

WELL KNOWN DOCTOR DIES

DR. R. L. WILSON HERALD, WHO VISITED PRINCE RUPERT SEVERAL TIMES, SUCCEUMS TO PNEUMONIA IN FERNIE

FERNIE, Jan. 3.—Dr. R. L. Wilson Herald of Nelson is dead here following a few days' illness with pneumonia.

The late Dr. Herald, who was fifty-seven years of age, was a prominent practitioner in Vancouver before the Great War in which he served and in which he lost a son.

After the war, he returned to British Columbia and, on account of his health, took up his residence in the interior of the province. Specializing in nose, ear and throat work, he travelled extensively through the province.

Members of the local medical fraternity were grieved this morning to hear of Dr. Wilson Herald's demise. He made several visits here two or three years ago, performing work in his capacity as a specialist.

DEATHS ON NEW YEAR IN SOUTH

MRS. EMILY McDONALD FOUND DROWNED IN TROUT LAKE; GEO. CLARKE GASSED IN RESIDENCE

VANCOUVER, Jan. 3.—Missing from her home here since early on Saturday, the body of Mrs. Emily McDonald, aged 49, was found drowned in Trout Lake, Burnaby, on Sunday afternoon. She was last seen alive early New Year's Eve. George Clarke, aged 35, was found dead in a gas filled room at his place of residence early yesterday. Clarke came from Regina about five weeks ago.

MIKE DOCTOR DIED TODAY

WAS WELL KNOWN IN CITY AS EMPLOYEE OF COLD STORAGE

The death occurred this morning of an old timer in the city in the person of Mike Doctor, an Estonian who had been resident here for about 15 years. Deceased was married and made his residence at 1144 Ninth Avenue East, having been employed for some time at the plant of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co.
