

Last year copper reached second place in point of value of production having been nearly \$700,000 greater than coal. During the war years, due to a very high price for copper, the production of this metal assumed first rank in mining in the province. Commencing in 1919, a heavy slump took place in both the quantity and value of the copper output, but a steady improvement has taken place in recent years, with the result that the output of 89,339,768 pounds of copper in 1926 was the highest ever made in the industry.

Zinc production in the last three years has also shown a large increase mainly due to operations at the Sullivan mine. but other mines are also contributing in part.
