RESPONSIBILITY FOR DAMAGE RESULT OF TANK INSTALLATION

A letter from John Christian, owner of property across the street, stating that he would hold the city responsible for increase in insurance rates or damage that might arise as a result of the installation of a gasoline storage tank at the corner of Third Avenue and McBride Street was referred to the city solicitor by the council last night. Mr. Christian, in his communication, stated that he had taken the matter up with the city engineer and had been informed by the city engineer that the city would not accept the responsibility. He (Mr. Christian) in turn would not accept this waiving of responsibility but insisted that the city itself was responsible. Aid. Perry stated that the city had nothing to do with it. Permission had been given by the provincial fire marshal. City Solicitor E. F. Jones, to whom the matter was referred, stated that Mr. Christian had no claim on the city.

UNPRECEDENTED FALL OF SNOW IN PRINCE RUPERT CONTINUING

With the wind in the east and the glass high but tending to drop, prospects this morning were for a continuation of the snowfall which already is proving quite unprecedented for the month of November in Prince Rupert. During the past twenty-four hours it is stated by H. D. Tee, Digby Island, Dominion meteorologist, a total of five-and-one-half inches of snow has fallen, bringing the total for the month to date to approximately fifteen inches. A change of the wind to southeast would probably bring rain.
