FOR SAFETY

Six Rules For Driving In Winter

Brains plus chains equal sound advice on snow and ice! That is a streamlined summary of the many important recommendations contained in "Basic Winter Driving Rules," a new booklet just published by the National Safety Council which sets down for the first time the results of 11 years of test research by the Council's Committee on Winter Driving Hazards.

The booklet is aimed at reducing the high death and accident rates resulting from inadequate traction and reduced visibility—the major winter driving problems from November through February.

Six basic rules for safe winter driving offered:

1. Get the feel of the road. Try your brakes occasionally, while driving slowly and away from other traffic, to find out just how slippery the road is.
2. Slow down. Adjust your speed to road and weather conditions so that you can stop or manoeuvre safely.
3. Keep windshield clear. You must see danger to avoid it, so be sure your headlights, windshield wiper blades and defrosters are in top-notch condition.
4. Use tire chains on snow and ice. They cut stopping distances about in half, and increase starting and hillclimbing traction by four to seven times. Even with the help of chains, however, lower than normal speeds are a must on snow and ice.
5. Pump your brakes to slow down or stop. Jamming them on can lock the wheels and throw your car into a dangerous skid.
6. Follow at a safe distance. Keep well back of the car ahead so you have room to stop. Remember that without tire chains it takes three to 12 times as far to stop on snow and ice as on dry concrete.

Playing Strictly by Book Doesn't Always Pay Off

Mrs. Rhule plays strictly by the book—or at least by her interpretation of the book. In her opinion, when her partner opens the bidding and she has three-and-a-half honor tricks, she makes a jump-shift. In today's deal she had better than three-and-a-half tricks. In fact, she had a little better than four tricks. Therefore, she had no hesitancy in bidding two spades over Mr. Champion's opening bid of one heart.

There are two serious faults in Mrs. Rhule's hand which should have made her decide to take things easy with a simple one over one response of one spade. The first is the void suit in her partner's bid suit. The second is the lack of solidity in her own two suits—spades and diamonds.

As usual, blind adherence to "rules" and lack of individual judgment led to disaster. When you make a jump-shift you must not only have a big hand, you must also have some reasonable idea as to where the hand can be played for a practically certain game. In this case Mrs. Rhule could not play either of her own suits at game without fairly good support from her partner. And obviously she could not support the suit her partner had bid.

Over her proper first response of one spade Mr. Champion would have rebid two hearts. Mrs. Rhule could then have bid

three diamonds and Mr. Champion would have said three hearts. Mrs. Rhule could now have rebid her diamonds at the four range. When Mr. Champion bid four hearts she should have passed, even with her void. And four hearts would have certainly been made.

As it was, Mrs. Rhule found the queen of clubs right and still went down three at five diamonds.

"Any way, we weren't doubled," said Mrs. Rhule. Mr. Champion shook his head sadly. "A real victory," he replied. "A real victory."

More Money, Better Roads Says Minister

INVERMERE, B.C. (CP)—As soon as the government will give him the money, he will "splash" it on roads, Works Minister Gagliardi told a Social Credit party meeting here.
