On recommendation of the finance committee, the city council last night awarded to Alex McRae Co., Ltd. the contract for the printing of some three thousand ledger sheets for the utilities department. There was but the one tender which was \$275.25.

At the suggestion of City Solicitor E. F. Jones who stated that the matter was an important one which should be considered by the full board, the city council last night deferred final consideration of the amended Street Traffic Bylaw until the meeting two weeks hence.

The court of revision on the 1928 municipal voters' list will sit on December 10 at 2 p.m. The following were chosen members of the court at last night's council meeting by Acting Mayor Stephens: Ald. Tinker, Ald. Linzey, Ald. W. J. Greer, Ald. Brown and Ald. Perry.

Ald. Linzey stated at last night's meeting of the city council that there had been considerable criticism at the closing of the reading room at such a time as this, when it was particularly popular, for the purpose of making repairs to the floor. Ald. Linzey was informed by Ald. W. J. Greer that it was expected that the work would be completed by today.

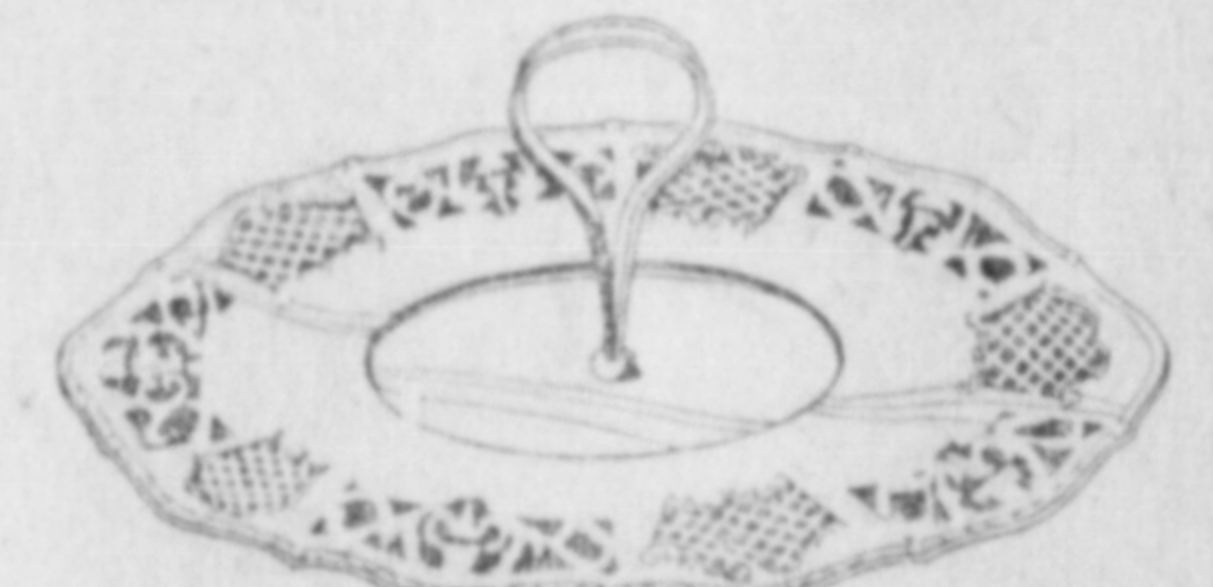
There was a bare quorum at last night's council meeting, those present being Ald. M. M. Stephens, who was elected acting mayor, Ald. G. P. Tinker, Ald. W. M. Brown, Ald. W. J. Greer and Ald. R. F. Perry. Mayor Newton is absent attending a Conservative convention in Vancouver; Ald. Jos Greer was out hunting, and the absence of Ald. Oscar Larsen was unaccounted for.

A report from the finance committee recommending the sale of bonds as follows to H. G. Hilland was accepted by the city council last night: \$2,000 five per cents due January 1934 at \$97.84; \$2,000 five-and-half per cents due January 1930 at \$100. Ald. Tinker informed the council that these were bonds which had been purchased by the city last year from a financial concern. The finance committee took the view that it would be advisable to sell them again and have the money to use.

C.N.R. HOTEL FOR VANCOUVER

Reclamation Work at False Creek Also to be Carried Out by Railway

VANCOUVER, Nov. 29.—An order-in-council authorizing the agreement between the city of Vancouver and the Canadian National Railway was passed by the federal cabinet at Ottawa this morning. Mayor Taylor is advised by Dr. J. H. King, to the effect that the Canadian National Hotel will be started in 1928 as well as the False Creek reclamation, involving an expenditure by the railways of at least \$7,000,000 within the next four years, it is said.

I.O.D.E. ENCOURAGES BRITISH FILMS TO BE SHOWN THIS COUNTRY

TORONTO, Nov. 29.—The Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire is endeavoring by precept and practice to promote the showing in Canada of British films, particularly in view of the fact that at the present time it is claimed that 92 per cent of the moving pictures shown in this country are foreign. Not long ago Lady Cowan, president of the British Women's Patriotic League and chairman of the British Film Committee of Patriotic Societies, toured Canada in support of a propaganda for British films and related Inter-Empire Problems. In an interview with Miss Church, president of the I.O.D.E., Lady Cowan stated that there was no basis in fact for the impression created by film producers in this country that desirable British films were not obtained for Canada but, on the contrary, British films, beautiful in portraiture, artistic in conception and wholesome in character were available provided that a sufficiently strong appeal for their use be forthcoming. These include dramatized stories by some of the best known British authors, fine travelogues and charming films of educational value for children.

With the idea of strengthening the bonds that unite all parts of the British Empire, of acquainting Britishers with the wonder and extent of the countries under the British flag, and of encouraging home products, an organization has been formed in Canada known as the Canadian Council for Empire Films, with headquarters in Toronto. In connection with this a provisional committee, of which Miss Church, president of the Daughters of the Empire is a member, has been formed pending the organization of a National Committee to include all organizations interested in this project. The first British picture to be presented under the aegis of the new organization is entitled "The Immortals of Bonnie Scotland" which will give pictures of the life of Sir Walter Scott with scenes from his best work, and of Bobbie Burns and the scenic inspiration of some of his poems. This production will be followed by other films which are epics of history, such as "The Battle of Falkland Islands," "Oronel," etc.

NATURE'S COLORS LADIES' BONNETS

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 29.—The grasshopper, the watermelon, the sky and a cereal are among the objects from which the new colors of new spring bonnets have been chosen, apparently for no reason at all. These colors have been announced at the convention here of the Millinery Association of America as among a group selected by the American Color Card Association for use of makers of women's wear. Merchandise of the new spring colors is to be released soon, millinery men say.

Grasshopper green, described as a new green softened with a slight gold tinge, blue skies blue, a soft blue with a slight lavender tinge, grapefruit, a deep honey of light brown caste, to match "the cereal bearing this name," are some of the colors. Watermelon red, a soft hue the color of the ripe watermelon; coral belle, a soft peach pink with a coral caste; kasha beige, a new string color favored in silks and dresses; roseglow, a new honey shade with a rose caste; emberglow, a tiger lily shade softened; Swiss rose, a rose shade favoring the real rose caste rather than the bluish rose, are announced as some of the outstanding new colors.

What is foreseen as a growing tendency toward longer tresses is to have its effect on hat shapes. The new models will tend toward elegance and coordination of the silhouette, calling for rich embroideries, smart touches of straw, novelty braids and other bits of deft coloring. There will be no radical departure from the present basic styles, however, nor will comfort be sacrificed.

Hats will be of soft, frameless type, made to fit the head comfortably with smaller or cloche type chapeaux continuing the mode except for flatter variety will remain in vogue.
