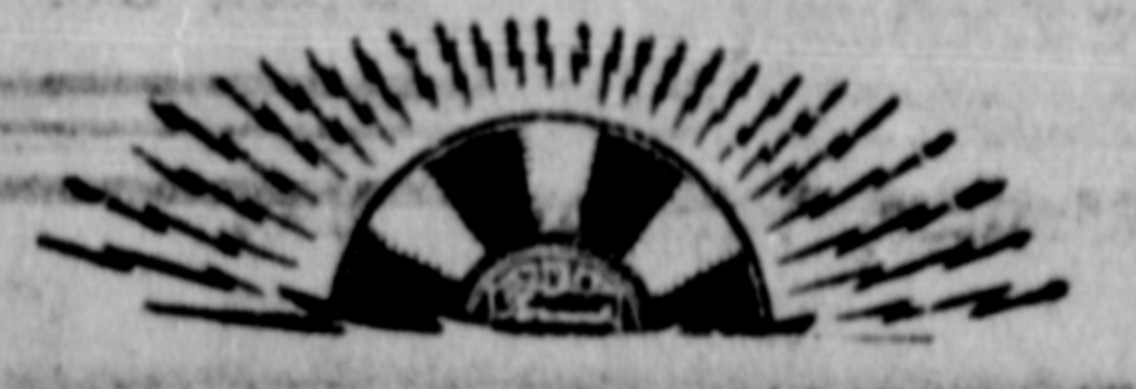

TOTEM POLE TO BE TAKEN DOWN

CITY ORDERS MENACING STRUCTURE AT SECOND AVE. AND SECOND STREET TO BE MOVED

The structure having been a menace to traffic, the totem pole at the intersection of Second Avenue and Second Street will be taken down by the Board of Works at once and its re-erection at some suitable location will be determined later according to a decision of the city council last night.

The matter came before the council in the form of a recommendation from the finance committee, which asked that the pole be removed and that the Board of Works be asked to undertake the job.

Ald. Perry thought the action a little hasty as it would be better to ascertain the proposed cost of the removal and then the matter could be further considered by the council.

Ald. Stephens said that several members of the Board of Trade had recently interviewed the finance committee on another subject and the matter of the pole was discussed. Those members of the Board of Trade who were present, he said, favored the removal of the pole as it was considered to be dangerous to traffic in its present location. If an accident occurred there the city would be held responsible and he thought that the sooner it was out of the way the better.

Ald. Perry inquired as to where it was proposed to erect it again and considered that it would be wise not to rush into the thing without first finding out what it would cost and whether it was going to be thrown away or put up in some other place.

ON GOVERNMENT PROPERTY? Ald. Jos. Greer said that at the meeting of the finance committee, it had been mentioned that the question might be taken up with Hon. T. D. Pattullo when he arrived in the city and perhaps a suitable location might be found on some of the provincial government property.

Ald. Brown favored the removal of the pole as soon as possible. He considered it very unsafe in the present location. It would be time enough to talk about putting it up again after it was down.

The recommendation was then adopted by the council on the understanding that the Board of Works confer with the Board of Trade as to a suitable location for the pole and then report back to the council for endorsement.

NATIVES HAVE MUCH ENERGY

PURCHASE OF KITKATIA BAND INSTRUMENTS AND NEW CHURCH AT FISHER BAY STRIKING EXAMPLES

Few people realize the energy which the natives of the district are ready to put into any project in which they become interested. As a recent example of this has been the purchase of and payment for a fine set of band instruments by the Kitkatia Indians last winter.

In the matter of building churches, the readiness of the natives to make sacrifices is conspicuous, several native villages during the past few years having put up really fine edifices entirely at their own cost.

This week there is being dedicated at Fishery Bay on the Naas River a large and well built church for the use of the many people who gather there for the oolachan fishing. This place is only occupied, at the most, three months in the year but the time is made an occasion for much religious revival and the small building there was felt to be inadequate and, accordingly, in its place, a structure seventy by fifty feet has just been erected. Very little aid was received from the outside, the work and most of the expense being looked after by the village of Greenville. The natives are, however, grateful for a few contributions made by Prince Rupert people and for the support given a concert the Greenville band gave some time ago, the proceeds of which went to the object. The white people at Mill Bay and Naas Harbor also assisted with a donation of about \$22. While the build-

GYMNASIUM SITE REPORT

CITY ENGINEER PRESENTS HIS VIEWS TO COUNCIL IN DOCUMENT

The report of the city engineer on proposed sites for the erection of a gymnasium was read at the meeting of the city council last night.

The report showed that the city had not the right to construct buildings on the property at Sixth Avenue and McBride Street. The site next to the Post Office was admirably suited for the construction of such a building but the character of the building required in that fire district would cost about \$8,000 more than if the building were erected on Fraser Street which was in another fire district. Either Acropolis Hill or Fraser Street property would be better from the point of view of the cost of the structure. In view, however, of the cost of the building, it would probably be better to know what money was available before any site was agreed on as, according to the plans, the building would cost in the

neighborhood of \$25,000 without equipment or heating. A motion to forward the letter to the committee which is considering the project, was passed by the council.

MORE HUSBANDS NOW DESERT WIVES AND CHILDREN 'TIS SAID

MONTREAL, April 12. (Canadian Press).—The "Star" says editorially: "Pitiable suffering is caused by the tragedy of husbands deserting their wives and children. There has been a marked increase of this cruel conduct for some years past. Statistics compiled from court records, in our own city, demonstrate the sorrowful fact that fully 23 per cent of the children placed in institutions of all kinds, and who are practically supported on charity, are 'innocents' who have been deserted by their fathers. And, think of it, in 24 per cent of these desertion cases the mother was left ill. Here we have brutal cruelty on the part of husband and father."
