LONDON, April 12 .- This is no time to bewail the past but to pay the bill," declared Ht. Hon. Winston Churchill, chancellor of the exchequer, in presenting his budget in the House of Commons yesterday. "It is not for me to apportion the blame but only to apportion the burden. I can present myself in the guise of an impartial judge. I am only the public exe-

"We will maintain our position as the financial centre of the world and our financial position is unimpaired," he asserted. 

VANCOUVER, April 12 .- Declaring himself a confirmed optimist regarding Canada's future, Lord Willingdon, Governor General, addressed the Vancouver Canadian Club yesterday. Referring to the possibilities of Canadian trade with the Orient, he said that he was convinced that China would soon be re-established under more settled conditions. "Certain propagandists in China have endeavored and, to some extent, have succeeded in stirring up antiforeign feeling among the Chinese people by talking of Imperialistic tendencies of foreign powers but," he said, "from my experience there

I can verify and sincerely say that I do not believe there is a single honest tair-minded Chinese, and I found a great START OF BIG many, who thinks any of the powers have any Imperialistic outlook with regard to their country. They all know well that the sole desire of all the great powers is to see peace come in their distracted country and to help, if the Chinese want help, in building up her national life until she takes her proper and important position among the nations of the world."
