# Provincial Government Gets Highest Price in Years for Bond Issue

VICTORIA, September 29 .- Bonds of the province of British Columbia amounting to \$6,000,000 were sold yesterday at a price higher than any realized by the province in almost forty years. To be exact it is the highest price since 1889. There were thirty tenders submitted and the bonds were sold to a syndicate composed of A. E. Adams Co., Wood Gundy Co., and the Royal Bank. The average yield of the issue will be 4.621/2 per cents.

The bids were 98.69 for the two-year-old four per cent bonds and 97.23 for the thirty-year 41/2 per cent.
