

California Has Plague of House Mice Which Destroy Foods, Clothing and Grain

BERKELEY, California, January 19 .- Kern County is alive with mice and, according to Raymond Hall, assistant director of the University of California museum, it is the strangest occurrence of its kind in the history of the United States. The pests are not field mice but house mice which makes the invasion all the more strange he says. Their breeding place is the bed of the reclaimed Buena Vista Lake, now a vast grain field. The roads and highways are carpeted with the tiny pests and they swarm into houses and barns, destroying in their path, foodstuffs, clothing, bad coverings and grain. Hall estimates that one pair of mice is responsible for the birth of more than sixteen thousand in a year's time.

REWARDED FOR HIS BRAVERY

WELL KNOWN LOCAL FISHERMAN RECEIVES MEDAL FROM * SPANISH SOCIETY

Reward for signal bravery displayed on January 4, 1922, came last night to Hilmar Mork, well known local halibut fisherman, in the form of a bronze medal with diploma from the Spanish life saving society through the Norwegian consul general at Montgeal. The presentation was made by John Dybhavn, local Norwegian vice-consul, at the annual meeting of St. Paul's Lutheran Church.

On the date mentioned, Mr. Mork was a member of the crew of the Norwegian freight steamer Randsfjord, which was anchored off the city of Gandia in the Gulf of Valencia on the coast of Spain when a terrific storm came up and a Spanish fishing vessel, Manuela Garceran, running for the harbor, capsized, eight members of the crew being thrown into the sea. Mr. Mork was one of the crew from the steamer sent out in a lifeboat to attempt the rescue of the drowning men. Swimming around in the turbulent waters for several hours, Mr. Mork was successful in saving all but one of the fishing vessel's distressed crew.

End Comes for Royal Woman Who Has Been Insane Sixty Years

BRUSSELS, January 19 .- Marie Charlotte, widow of the Emperor Maximilian of Mexico, died this morning at the age of 85 years. She was suffering from pneumonia and it was realized a few days ago that, owing to her advanced age, she could not recover.

The life of the "mad Empress" Charlotte was filled both with romance and pathos. For more than half a century, after she fell in a faint at the feet of Napoleon III. at the court of St. Cloud when he refused the aid of France for her husband, she was considered by many to have been insane but whether she was really mentally unbalanced has remained a mystery for *

all that time. her fortune grew throughout the half century until it was estimated to have amounted from 60,000,000 to 100,000,000

SPOTS ON SUN ARE DISCERNED

ERUPTIONS DISCOVERED AT VIC-TORIA ASTRONOMICAL STATION VISIBLE TO NAKED EYE

VICTORIA, Jan. 19 .- Two sun spots, eruptions on the sun's surface, were discerned yesterday from the Dominion astronomical observatory on Little Saanich mountain. The spots could be seen with the naked eye with the aid of smoked glasses. The larger spot was estimated at approximately 50,000 miles in diameter and was situated at the sun's meridian at about forty degrees latitude while the smaller was near the equator east of the meridian forty degrees.
