Japanese Ships Collide During Manoeuvres and Over Hundred Lives Lost

LONDON, August 25 .- One hundred and twenty lives it is ared were lost in a collision between two warships during manuvres off the Japanese navy port of Maizuru, says a Tokio despatch Reuters.

The cruiser Jintsu collided with the destroyer Waraba in the rkness and the destroyer sank in fifteen minutes, with a loss of men and petty officers and twelve officers, there being but 22 rvivors of the whole ship's company.

SHIP DAMAGE FOUND HEAVY

Prince Rupert Will be Out of Commission Until September 15-Calling For Tenders

VANCOUVER, Aug. 25.-Examination of the Canadian National steamer Prince Rupert was completed today and it was estimated that the .vessel had sustained damage of nearly \$30,000 in the crash up the coast last week-end. Thirteen plates are dented on the port side near the stern, the hand steering gears badly jammed and the rudder frame is bent.

Tenders are being called for repairs and it is likely the vessel will not be ready to resume service until September 15.
