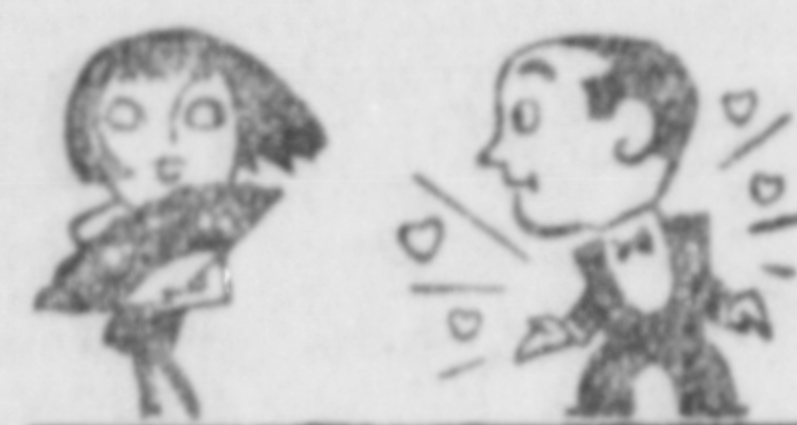

CITY MANAGER ADVOCATED

Editor, Daily News.
The writer would like to see Prince Rupert adopt the City Manager plan of government. The city manager to be also Industrial Commissioner and the manager to be allowed an assistant manager, qualified to assume the duties of city engineer.

The assistant should be responsible to no one but the manager—who would have the appointing of his assistant.
The city manager plan is the only efficient way to conduct the business of a city successfully.

With our neighbors to the south, about 15 cities discarded the old way to adopt the newer plan and one never hears of them changing back to the old system.

A city is a big business, the citizens are the stockholders. Therefore it should be managed as a big business, with one responsible head.

Take the case of a flour mill for Prince Rupert or some other industry suitable for the place. He could look over the mills in Vancouver, and elsewhere, obtain data, regard to cost, etc. His next step might be to see how much of the cost would be taken up by Prince Rupert people and after that get in touch with outsiders interested in the same lines in a big way.
