

Peace River Should Have Western Outlet Declares Agent General in London

VANCOUVER, October 15 .- A Pacific Coast outlet for the Peace River country is a necessity if the full possibilities of that region are to be realized, declared F. A. Pauline, agent general for B.C. in London, addressing the foreign trade bureau of the Board of Trade here yesterday. He said he believed that through the Peace River British Columbia would eventually take its place as a wheat exporting province.

Mr. Pauline painted a bright picture of increasing export trade from British Columbia to Great Britain, citing the rise of lumber exports from sixteen million feet in 1923 to between seventy and seventy-five million feet this year.
