SCREEN FLASHES
 A tense and true-to-life story of three British airmen's escape from a German prisoner-of-war camp was the exciting fare for those who attended last night's "Curtain at 8:30" presentation at the Totem Theatre.
 In "The Wooden Horse," Eric Williams re-told in fictionalized form his account of an escape in which he himself took part and which he first narrated in a book that became a best-seller. The almost unbelievable adventure started when one of the trio conceived a "classic" way out of Stalag Luft III, inspired by the Trojan Horse of Homeric fame. Under the noses of their captors and in broad daylight the airmen burrowed a tunnel beneath the camp grounds, with the entrance concealed by a vaulting horse. The difficulties and suspense caused when the tunnel opening had to be covered every night and the diggers carried back to barracks inside the "horse" provided a toe-curling thriller.
 An effective feature of the picture was its unpretentious approach. The prison life was convincing, and the cast appeared as genuinely exhausted as the audience felt when it was over.

Skillful Use of Color In Decorating

One of the prime means of achieving beauty in the home is through the intelligent and skillful use of color.

Color is a powerful tool in home decoration; wisely used it can create mood and atmosphere, give your home grace and charm. Misuse of color has been the downfall of more than one well-meaning effort to achieve good decoration.

Miss Eileen Cross, Director of the Home Economics Service of the University of British Columbia Department of Extension, emphasizes that home decorators must keep a few basic facts in mind when dealing with color.

"Knowing the names of the colors is not enough," Miss Cross declares. "You must understand the 'why' of the names."

Pastel tints give a feeling of fragility, airiness and space while the darker shades give a feeling of masculinity, strength and dignity.

Both tints and shades are widely used in home decoration and through their proper use unity, contrast, emphasis and variety are achieved. The greater the contrast the greater will be the gayety, liveliness and movement in a room.

Too many contrasts will bring confusion. Background colors should be of nearly the same value and contrast should be added by accessories and people.

Objects will differ in size because of their color value. Light values will give the impression of greater size while dark values will decrease the feeling of size. This applies to walls, furniture and upholstery materials.

By graying hues it is possible to produce other variations of color. Graying reduces the brightness or intensity of color and can be used in large areas. Full strong colors should be used in moderate amounts and as accents. In large amounts they are tiring and produce the effects of loudness and vulgarity.

Today the soft muted colors such as sandalwood, mint-green, coral, rosewood and French blue have become very popular and give a room quietness and good taste.

Double-Strength Brew in Store For Britons

LONDON (Reuters)—Television is changing Britain's beer-drinking habits and the new double strength coronation brew announced Monday may encourage the shift from the local "pub" to the living room.

In Britain TV is almost strictly a home affair. Few sets are mounted in the old-style taverns. With video's growing popularity, the trend is to take home a dozen bottles of beer instead of sticking around the pub for the nightly pint.

The special beer to be brewed in honor of the coronation is to be put in souvenir bottles. Few drinkers will be tempted to go home from their local bar with pockets full of empty souvenirs. They will be much more likely to lay in a stock for home consumption—with or without TV.

British pubs are full of "atmosphere"—and ranging from stained glass windows and brown-and-white Tudor architecture to plain paneled rooms stacked with huge wooden casks.

But most of it is lost on the average Briton. He goes there because there is a fire. Many now are staying in their radiator-less homes with a small gas heater and the TV set.

Draft beer sells for the equivalent of 20 cents a pint glass. The coronation ale, twice as strong, will go for about 35 cents—in a decorated "nip" bottle holding about six ounces.

Double-strength ale is nothing new. As the "gravity" of British beer has declined in late years excuses for strong brew have been welcome. Last excuse was the "festival ale" brewed for the 1951 Festival of Britain.

Unlike Muzzy, Champion Knows How To 'Gamble'

Mr. Muzzy often makes what he calls "gambling" bids. Usually these are not gambles at all. They are sure things. That is, the opponents are sure to get all the points. These bids consist of blind slams at game or slam contracts, completely unjustified by the cards actually held.

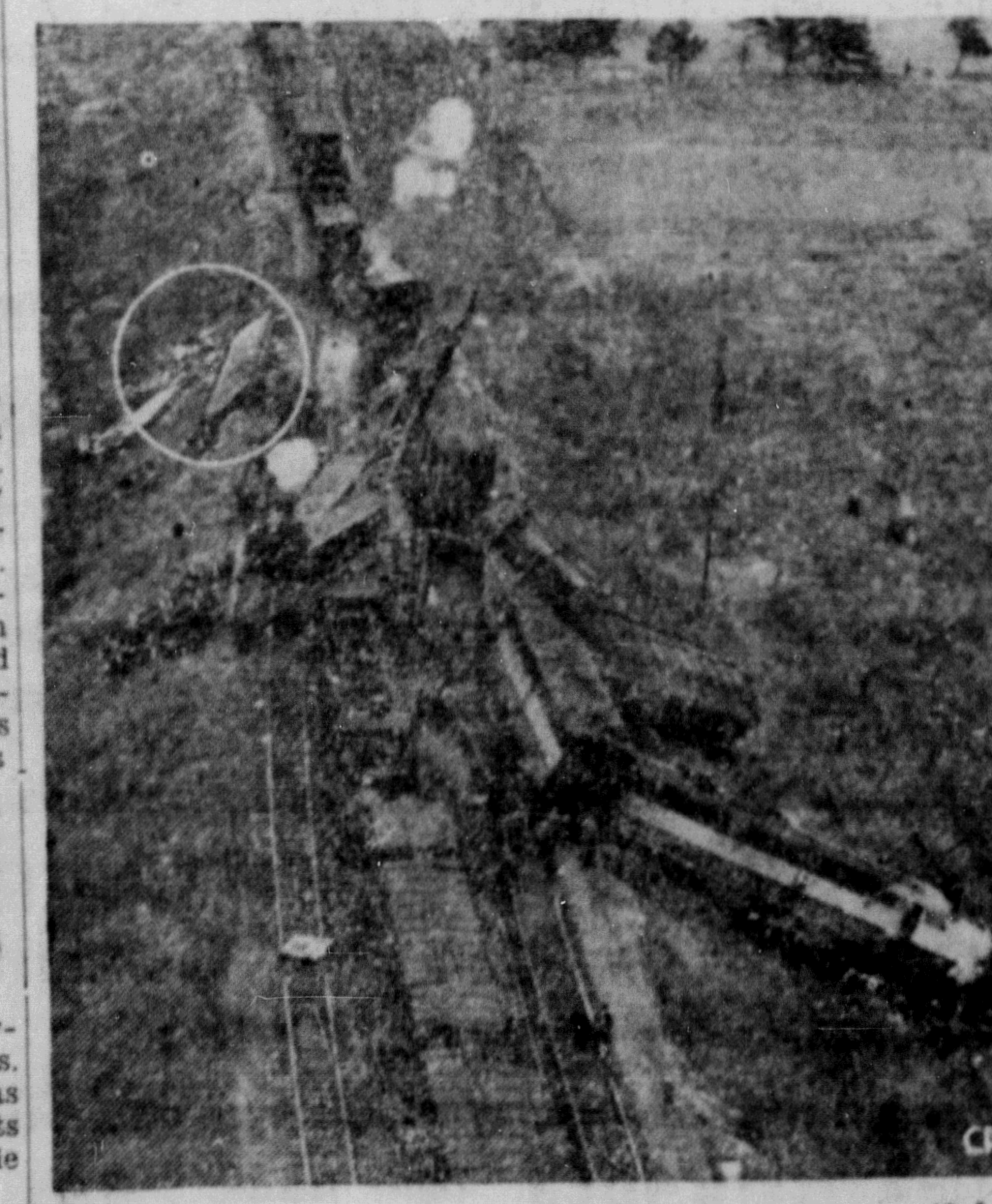
When Mr. Muzzy incurs the ire of his partner after one of these "gambling" bids has been doubled and set eight hundred, his standard remark is, "Well, you've got to take a gamble now and then in this game." The implication is that if you don't go along with his bidding insanity you are lacking in sporting blood. If you played with Mr. Muzzy as a partner all the time, then, you would have only two choices. You could be a coward—or you could be a pauper.

One of the comforting things about playing with a fine partner is that you don't have to push the bidding for fear of missing your maximum contract. In today's deal Mr. Champion described his own hand accurately as possible, knowing that the final decision between a small or a grand slam would be made correctly by his partner, Mr. Masters.

Mr. Masters' bidding was as strong as it could be, short of bidding the grand slam himself. After his first bid, the jump take-out in hearts, he bid both spades and clubs with the intention of indicating first round controls in those two suits. Then he jumped to six diamonds.

Throughout the course of bidding, Mr. Masters had clearly indicated that he had a minimum opening bid. When the auction reached the six diamond stage he still had a minimum hand. Yet he went on to seven. He correctly reasoned that the only thing worrying Mr. Champion was the trump suit itself. For example, he would have had S-Q J 9, H-4, D-A J 8 7 4, C-K Q J 9. And, with that holding, the grand slam would have been hopeless.

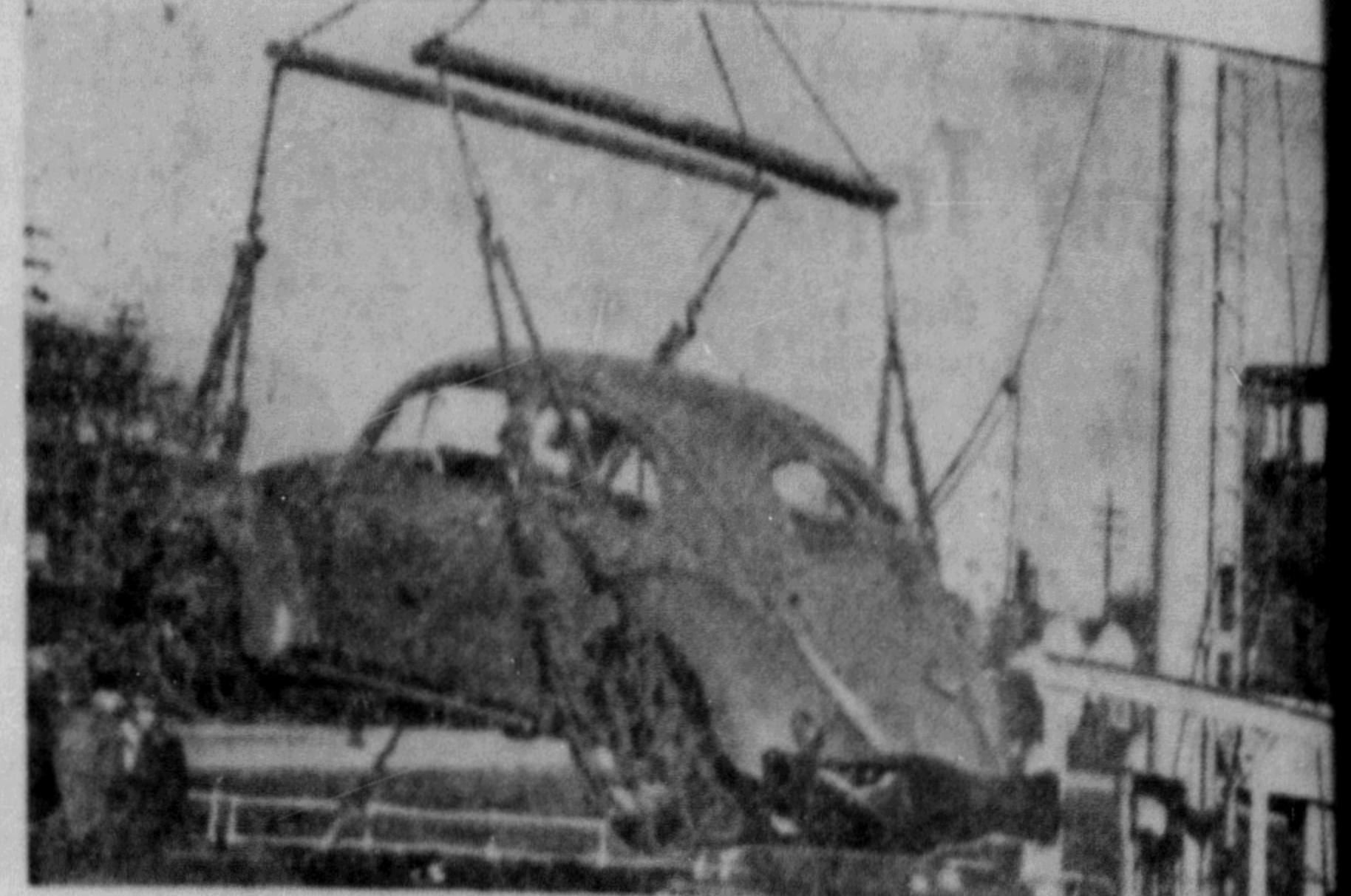
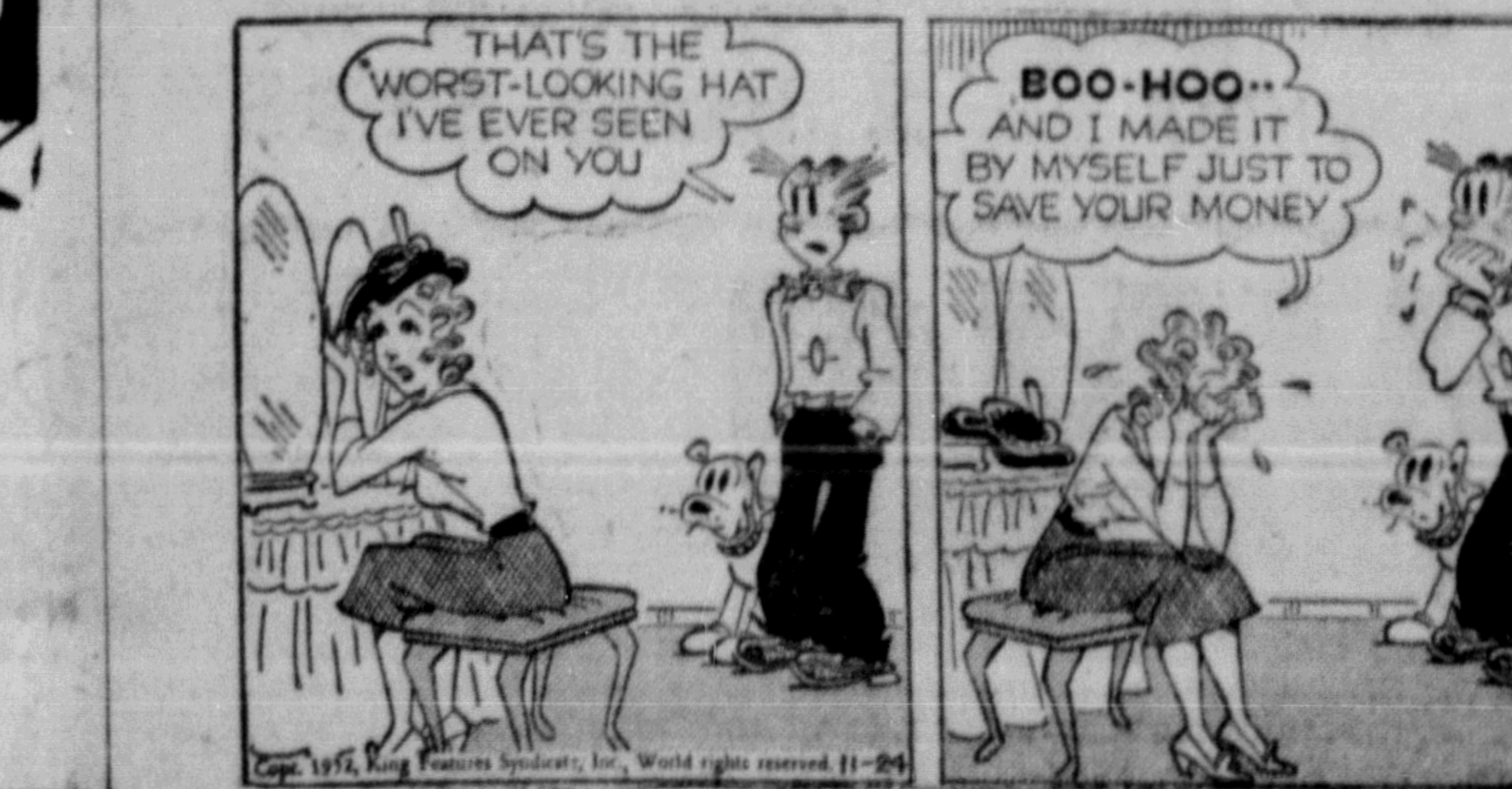
But holding a five-card suit headed by three of the top four honors he felt that the odds were 2 to 1 or better that the combined hands would win thirteen tricks.
