The option period expired yesterday and for some time past the Whitney interests have been negotiating with the Dominion and Provincial governments in connection with the building of 85 miles of railway to connect the mine with the Canadian National -*Railway.

VICTORIA. Dec. 1. - Because a Prince Rupert jury returned a verdict that Lee Foon, Chinese, was guilty of wounding with intent to do bodily harm, the British Columbia Court of Appeal decided that the conviction was for common assault and reduced the sentence from four years to twelve months, the prisoner immediately going free as he had served longer than that. TOURIST TRADE VERY VALUABLE

One Million Visitors Left \$30,-000,000 Behind Them in Vancouver Vicinity This Year

VANCOUVER, Dec. 1.-One million eighty six thousand tourists, their stay averaging three days each and spending \$10 or more per day on very conservative estimates, visited the Pacific Coast area of British Columbia between January 1 and October 1 leaving behind them \$30,500,000 according to the Greater Vancouver Publicity Bureau. No account in the estimate is taken of tourists through ports other than those connected with the Pacific Highway nor those from the Canadian provinces. Estimated monetary returns place the tourist traffic fourth among the industries of the province
