

ALL IMMIGRANTS ARE WORKING ON FARMS

EDMONTON, June 15.-Labor bureaus in the city were swamped this morning with orders for laborers which they could not fill. At the C.N.R. Coloniza. tion office 150 men were required, and not one could be found. The Ukrainian Immigration and Colonization Association needed 80 men, while the North German Lloyd required at least 40. The majority of the jobs offered were on farms, with wages running from thirty to forty dollars per month, and the prospect of the work lasting all summer. A large number of men åre also needed for railway maintenance

Commenting on the situation, employment officials stated that the large number of unemployed men, who are loitering around C.N.R. station and 101 Street, are men who have been in Canada for a year, and want work with bigger pay than farmers are willing to pay at this time of year.
