**MANY MURDERS
IN VANCOUVER**

Capital Offences Prominent in
Docket of Assizes at Southern
City

VANCOUVER, Sept. 28.—Thirteen
cases, including four murder charges,
came before the grand jury at the fall
assizes, opening here yesterday before
Mr. Justice W. A. Macdonald.

One case, in which two Japanese
named Wakabayashi and Nakamura was
removed from the Assize list when the
accused elected to take a speedy trial.

The four capital charges on the list
are against Thomas G. Clark, Dr. J. S.
Gladwin, Geoffrey Walker Donald, and
Uchi Yaoki. There is one other case
which comes under the heading of a
capital charge, James Edgecombe, ac-
cused of criminal assault.

There is one attempted murder
charge to be heard, that against T.
Matsuo, and two manslaughter charges,
the accused being William Huggins and
George Carefoot.

Charges in other cases on the list are:
Morris McKay Williams, bribery; Sam
Blumberger, receiving stolen property;
Thomas Waylow, statutory; Tony Stoppa,
statutory and Lim Gim, selling drugs.

VANCOUVER, Sept. 28.—Following the

that the British Columbia salmon pack
this season would fall far short of ex-
pectations, a meeting is being arranged
by canners to consider what steps may
be taken to protect the industry.

It is understood that an agreement
will be reached whereby the amount of
gear will be reduced, as well as the
length of nets. Orders for equipment
for the 1928 season must be given in
October, it is stated, so that action may
be taken in the near future.

Another matter which will prob-
ably be discussed at the meeting is the
establishment, or re-establishment, of
aeroplane patrols for protecting of the
industry against illegal fishing.

Prominent canners state that they
are fully alive to the necessity of re-
ducing operations, and some favor cut-
ting the number of seine licenses in
half and the number of gill nets by 30
