BUSINESS OF PROVINCE UP

BANK OF MONTREAL REPORT SEES BRIGHTER CONDITIONS IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

In British Columbia the volume of wholesale trade is somewhat in advance of last year; retail trade is fair, with sales of spring goods commencing, says the Bank of Montreal monthly report on business conditions. Lumber production is again reaching normal capacity with demand only slightly improved; export trade is handicapped by prevailing high ocean freight rates. The shingle industry is quiet. The large logging camps are also quiet and log prices are low. Pulp and paper mills find a steady demand for their capacity output. The market for canned salmon is weak, but contracts are being made for this year's pack at good prices. Mineral production is at a high level. Late varieties of apples are understood to have brought good returns; others

generally were disappointing. Weather conditions in fruit growing districts have so far been favorable. Considerable building activity is looked for this year.

WILL FOLLOW C.N. EXAMPLE

ENGLISH RAILWAYS INTERESTED IN METHODS OF SIR HENRY THORNTON

LONDON, April 8.—The English railway world is considerably interested in a circular shortly to be sent out by Sir Jos. Stamp, president of the executive of the London, Midland and Scottish Railway. John Bromley, M.P., and secretary of the Locomotive Engineers and Firemen's union, writing in the Locomotive Journal, says that the object is to aim at more economical working of the railway by taking the staff into the greatest confidence of the higher officers of the company.

Bromley refers in his enquiries last year into the operation of the Canadian National Railway when he found that its progress was largely due to the method of Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National, in getting the staff and the workers' unions into his confidence, thus insuring mutual co-operation and better working and meeting existing competition.

CARE URGED IN CONVERSATION

HUNTER CORNER spent a few days in town last week renewing old acquaintances. He was accorded a hearty welcome by all his old friends.

VICTORIA, April 8.—"Be careful of your conversation," was the advice of Mr. Justice Aylay Morrison, of the British Columbia Court of Appeal, in an address here before a meeting of business men.

"Remember and be meticulously careful of the meaning of your conversation; that is one of the necessities of every-day life" he said. "Do not be afraid of being pedantic. We should not subordinate ourselves for fear of being thought conceited, but place the true value upon words. Carelessness with the value of words leads men to trouble."

There is a certain superficiality in the understanding of the Scriptures, for instance, said the jurist.

The term empire, he pointed out, was almost invariably misunderstood in the average mind. The British Empire, he said, was often construed to mean something vague and materialistic, something having its beginning in Downing Street. But, said the speaker, the British Empire was truth. It was not associated particularly with territoriality, with the state, but with the people—in whom was the sovereignty.

SKIDEGATE

J. L. Barge, government agent at Queen Charlotte City, Mrs. Barge and Miss Mona Phair came down last week to visit friends at Skidgate. They made the trip on Capt. C. Martin's launch Rambler.

Rev. J. Gillett, Indian agent for the Queen Charlotte Islands, came down from Massett on business on the last trip of the Prince John. He held service at the Dufferin Pattullo school on Sunday morning and in the evening preached in the United Church at Skidgate Mission. Rev. Peat, the United Church minister at Skidgate, presented an address of welcome to Mr. Gillett.

Capt. G. Munro of Vancouver returned to the inlet on the last trip of the Prince John and has taken up the position of government scaler at the Gillespie logging camp on Lena Island.
