

### Ald. Jos. Greer's Suggestion Not Favored by City Council Last

NOT TO INVITE

A suggestion by Ald. Jos. Greer that General Frank Sutton, who contemplates the continuation of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway into the Peace River country, be invited to inspect the port of Prince Rupert in the hope that he might be induced to drop some of his millions here, met with short shrift at last night's council meeting.

The general, Ald. Greer said, seemed to have plenty of money and he was taking considerable interest in the country. He wondered if it wouldn't be a good Idea to invite him to visit Prince Rupert and show him what this city had. It couldn't do any harm, as far as he could see, and it might be a good stroke of business to invite him.

Mayor Newton said that he did not want to throw cold water on the idea and, if the council so decided, he would not object to General Sutton being in. vited here. All these money people were worth while Prince Rupert courting. General Sutton's proposal, however, with regard to the P.G.E. had been much to the fore at the recent convention of the Western Canada Unity nd Development League but the big majority had deemed that the more feasible plan was to ask Dominion government engineers to locate a different route than that to the Peace River. Prince Rupert, the mayor opined, was more likely to benefit in that way than it would if General Sutton built the P.G.E. into the Peace River to the sole benefit of Vancouver. He took the view that it was more advisable as far as Prince Rupert was concerned to leave the uestion the way the League had left





### MAYOR REPORTS

Attendance at Gatherings in South of Benefit to City, Asserts Newton

PEACE RIVER OUTLET

Received Support of Western Development League in Claim for Rupert Road

The following report was presented to the city council last night by Mayor Newton covering his recent attendance as the city's delegate at the Union of B.C. Municipalities' convention in Nanaimo and at the conference of the Western Canada Development and Unity League at Victoria:

"As your delegate I duly attended all the sessions of the two-day convention of the Union of B.C. Municipalities at Nanaimo as well as those of the threeday conference of the Western Canada Development and Unity League in Vic-

"These organizations being of an advisory nature, of course no present benefit can be pointed to as a result of your representation. But the time was most profitably spent, and I believe in due time will show forth fruit.

"No mistake can be made by future councils actively participating in the deliberations of these bodies, for it will indicate that Prince Rupert is fully alive to its importance as one of the chief centres of Western Canada.

MUNICIPAL DOINGS "From the Prince Rupert point of view the main items before the Union of B.C. Municipalities Convention were as follows:

Hospital costs .- This proved the most contentious of the sessions. Many of the delegates desired to reduce the present 70c per day municipal grant to 50c. It was decided, however, to stay by the 70c grant for another year at least, as the only possible way of maintaining hospital efficiency. I spoke in support of this viewpoint.

Penalty clause.—The retention of the present 15 per cent on tax arrearages was overwhelmingly re-affirmed with my vote going in opposition.

"School Tax-It was decided to recommend the imposition of a one per cent, school tax on all incomes. voted against this proposal, but it carried by a small margin.

"Mayoralty Term .- A two year term

was approved, providing the principle was first endorsed through the medium of a plebiscite by any municipality desirous of a change from the present one-year system.

"Fire Insurance.--The proposal that fire insurance rates should not be changed without three months' notice was endorsed.

"License Fees .- In agreement that the distribution of motor license fees and WATER MAIN pari-mutuel tax should be the same as pari-mutuel tax should be the same as that for liquor profits, school attendance in each year should be the basis instead of the present basis of census figures, the union will ask the Government to make this change.

WESTERN LEAGUE

"Interested as I certainly was in the doings of the Union of B.C.
