EDMONTON MAN BEATEN TO DEATH IN DOWN-TOWN HOTEL -TWO MEN CHARGED

VANCOUVER, April 5,-Marshall Douglas, advertising solicitor of Edmonton.. was battered to death in the room of a downtown hotel between 11:30 fast night, when he entered the place with two companions, and 1:30 this morning when they left.

Robert Moore, aged 39, and Angus Nicholson, 34, were arrested early this morning at the former's apartment and were charged with murder. They appeared in court a few hours later and were remanded until next week pending the finding of a coroner's jury.

The body of Douglas, who arrived here from Edmonton on March 17. was found hanging over a bed with numerous wounds on head and body and an empty liquor bottle on the blood-stained floor.

Earlier in the evening, police answered a call to Davie and Thurlow Street where the men were reported to have been fighting. Douglas, Moore and Nicholson were taken to police headquarters where it was explained that Douglas had fallen and bruised his face. The men were released, apparently on friendly terms.

When they were arrested after the murder, the clothing of Moore and Nicholson is alleged to have been bloodstained.
