Winnipeg People Are Hysterical Over the Mysterious Murders

BIG BUSINESS DONE IN LOCKS AND DOOR CHAINS AND CHILDREN KEPT FROM STREETS IN SOME DISTRICTS

WINNIPEG, June 14 .- Winnipeg and the surrounding districts is in almost a hysterical mood since the week end, following the strangling of two women. The police station and newspaper offices have been besieged without interruption by persons seeking information throughout the city.

In the suburbs the doors have been kept locked and the hardware and departmental stores have profited by the rushing business selling locks and door chains. Children are kept from the streets in many sections of the city. Doors are opened cautiously for bakers and other delivery men.

So far over one hundred suspects have been taken to headquarters by the police but all have been released.






