Waterfront Whiffs

Big Event at Yacht Club Tomorrow: Trolling Results Good so Far: Many Changes Noted During Week

A splendid program has been prepared for the Prince Rupert Rowing & Yacht Club's third annual regatta which will be held tomorrow off the club floats. All that is wanted now is a little kind treatment from the Weather Man. Everything else is in readiness and all the local yachtsmen are rarin' to go. Jack Lindsey, president of the club, and Alex McDonald, chairman of the regatta committee, will have to keep a firm hand on things, otherwise everybody will be trying to start at once and that will never do.

First event and one of the most important of the day will be the grand parade of all boats in the harbor at 10 a.m. This is open and free to all and for the best decorated boats there will be prizes of \$15, \$10 and \$5. This feature will take the most of the morning and gives promise of being quite spectacular. If Prince Rupert decorates its water vehicles as it did those on land in the Diamond Jubilee of Confederation celebration, there will be no doubt of success of this aquatic spectacle.

Opening the afternoon program at one o'clock will be the cruiser handicap race for club boats only from the club floats to Casey buoy and return, a course of nine miles. The prize will be the Swag cup. The only anticipated difficulty about this race will be to keep George Bryant from going to Kitada with the Harla; Doc Cade with the Edac from Butze Rapids, and Frank Allan from Lucy Island with the Collier.

At 1:30 will take place the rowing race—mixed doubles—for club members only. First prize will be \$5 and second prize, \$2.50. One of the featured participants in this is expected will be "Look Pleasant" Ben and his good lady who will show the congregation assembled how they get where they want to go when Polinettia falls down on them.

This will be followed by the club's open boat handicap race for club power boats, the prize being the club cup. This is one of the big events each year and it is hoped the boys will not act so disgracefully as they did last year therein.

The men's doubles rowing race at 2:30 should bring out the stalwarts of the club. Prizes of \$5 and \$2.50 will be awarded to help the winners get into the gasboat class.

The club speedboat handicap for the club cup will start at 3 o'clock. Here Doc Alexander and the other fast ones will have their innings.

The ladies' singles rowing race at 3:30 should show that gentler sex are just as peppy as their inferior halves. As long as there is no halpurning and everybody gets her last word every-thing should go well. Apparently the management is not capitalizing the ladies' efforts very highly for all they are giving in the way of prizes is \$3 and \$2.50.

The speedboat handicap race open to all at 4 o'clock should be productive of considerable interest. The yacht club members are confident that they can keep the prize at home against all comers.

The men's singles rowing race at 4:30 p.m. will prove the strong man of the port. As long as they confine their strength to rowing it will be O.K. Prizes will be \$3 and \$1.50.

The closing event will be the relay race for club boats only at 5 o'clock. The three boats that get along the best will get a prize of \$7.50.

Capt. Arthur Slater, well known and popular skipper of the C.P.R. coaster Princess Louise, was marked with a unique distinction early Monday morning of this week at Vancouver when he tied up his ship at Pier B-C, the first vessel to cast her lines to that fine new improvement on the waterfront of the southern. To mark the occasion he was presented with a silk topper and mounted cane.

With F. W. Knewstubb, a government engineer on board P.R.B.H. powerboat "23," Capt. Laurie Lambly, has been making trips this week to water power sites adjacent to the city. On Monday, the boat left for the Skeena river, returning to port on Thursday after visits had been made to Kitada and Falls River. Yesterday departure was made for Thulme River in Wark Channel.

NEW SKEENA FERRYBOAT

Stewart Donaldson was in port on Thursday with his new ferryboat Two Rivers for use between Haysport and Port Essington. Built at Port Essington during the winter, the new vessel is a fine, substantial looking craft of 45 feet length and powered with a 30 h.p. Frisco-Standard engine.

Yachting parties from the south are coming steadily now. During the past week the New Westminster cruiser Sanitis and the Vamoose of Seattle were here.

The new trolling boat Alina, built at Seal Cove during the winter, was down at Cow Bay floats this week outfitting for work.

Powerboat Leila, acquired recently from Dr. R. G. Large of Port Simpson by Jack Cook of this port, has been put in the fishery patrol service.

The seineboat, Lincoln paid her monthly visit in port on Monday from Massett.

N. M. McLean has broken ground at Seal Cove for his new boat-building establishment. The Cow Bay shop has now been closed and Mac will next open for business at the new site.

Powerboat Eleanor Mac, belonging to Jarvis McLeod of this city, has been placed in a packing charter for Carlisle cannery on the Skeena river.

Two native seimeboats, belonging to Henry Brown and Henry White, which were built at Langara Island during the winter, have arrived at Cow Bay for electrical installation and other finishing touches. They will engage in fishing out of Langara.

IMPROVEMENTS AT FLOATS

Considerable improvements have been completed at the Prince Rupert Rowing & Yacht Club floats by Mitchell & Currie. New under logs have been put in and planking replaced but the most imposing item the new work is the flagpole and cross arms put up at the entrance walk.

The new halibut boat Emblem, belonging to Haakon Lund and Peter Bruno, which was built at the dry dock, left yesterday on her maiden trip to the halibut grounds, having spent the fore part of the week in finally outfitting. She is a decided acquisition to the local fleet.

The halibut boat Zapora belonging to Lars Voge, another fine new vessel of dry dock production, is also having final touches put on before taking up a salmon packing charter for the summer.

The keel was laid at the Suga boat-building yard on Thursday for a stock model 32-foot trolling boat. The type of engine is not yet decided on.

The big highmaster Jessie, now engaged in halibut fishing out of this port, leaves this week-end on her return to the grounds. The Jessie has been in port for the week following her second halibut trip which she completed on arrival here last Saturday.

LANDINGS JUST AVERAGE

Halibut landings this past week being about average in volume, the total at this port for the season to date standing at 13,235,300 pounds is still slightly less than last year's 13,332,400 pounds at a corresponding date. One good week will put this year ahead of last.

During the past week (Saturday to Friday inclusive) a total of 749,400 pounds was marketed here of which 486,000 pounds was American halibut and 263,400 pounds Canadian.

This year's totals to date are as follows: American, 9,310,600 pounds; Canadian, 3,824,700 pounds; total, 13,135,300 pounds.

Last year's figures at a corresponding date were: American, 9,552,200 pounds; Canadian, 3,780,200 pounds; total, 13,332,400 pounds.

A temporary shortage of refrigerator cars somewhat handicapped the situation this week but a full supply of freezers is now said to be on the way and the railway authorities give assurance that there will be no further trouble of this nature.

Prices were rather low throughout the week. The highest American bid of the week was 13.7c and 6c paid on Wednesday for three small catches. The highest Canadian price was 12.7c and 6c on the same day. Lows were 11c and 5.5 on Saturday for American and 10c and 5c on the same day for Canadian.

His many friends will be gratified to learn that Bill Purl, well known troller of the boat Star, is making splendid progress toward recovery following a successful operation in the Prince Rupert General Hospital for appendicitis.

Trolling operations have met with much more success so far this season in outside waters than they have inside. While all reports indicate that the boats at Hippo Island are having great success and that those at Dundas Island are doing fairly well, the situation is just the opposite in Wark Channel. So far, the run there has been extremely poor but it is expected the fish will soon start to move in there and then things ought to show an improvement.

SPORT CHAT

Now that the excitement of the Dominion Day special sports is dying down, players and fans will settle once more to the regular local league goings. There is still an interesting schedule of baseball ahead and the soccer league activities are still young. Ketchikan has been here and probably won't be coming again this season. The Stuart Shield and Dominion Day cup soccer trophies have been lost and won. The season is now half way through but the second half may be the best although the first was satisfactory enough.

Two world's champions and other noted boxers are working out in Chicago for bouts in Cub's park next Tuesday night. Mushy Callahan, Los Angeles, meets Sammy Baker, New York. Callahan is world's junior welterweight king, Fidel Labarba, fly-weight champion, boxes Pat Moore, Memphis, and Spug Myers, Idaho, clashes with Stanley Loayza.

A communication from the Trades and Labor Council was received by the Board of Trade at its meeting last night and referred to the mining committee for report. It had to do with the use of Canadian coal by Canadians.

Frank Waterhouse freighter Arran Firth and the Coastwise Steamship & Barge Co.'s Anyox were in port today discharging freight. They were tied up at the Grand Trunk wharves.
