

MUCH MONEY TO BE SPENT IN PORTLAND CANAL DISTRICT ON HIGHWAYS

As an indication of the growth of the district the Provincial Government is this year undertaking the greatest o road and trail building program in the history of the camp, entalling expenditures of from \$80,000 to \$100,000 says the Portland Canal News.


