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TERRACE FARMER IS MAKING GOOD

James A. McConnell, Former Alberta Grain Grower, Tells of His Success in Mixed Farming

James A. McConnell writes from Terrace to the "Last West," a Canadian National Railways publication, as follows: "I had the twenty acres which I bought here in 1921 all cleared and plowed by the end of 1924. I have now planted a large number of fruit trees, bush and vine fruits, which, with the exception of the young trees, are giving good returns. I also have part of the land under hay and clover. This winter I kept about 300 Leghorn hens, which produced a revenue of \$25 a week, that sum being realized from the sale of eggs. In addition we used a large quantity for our table." Mr. McConnell moved to Terrace from Alberta after he decided to retire from grain farming.

ALICE ARM

The Kitsault-Eagle Silver Mines Ltd. will develop the three properties—Eagle, Silver Cord and Leroy—on a large scale this year according to A. Compressors will be installed at both the Eagle and Silver Cord and the construction of camps and trail improvements starts immediately.
