BEST CUSTOMER

KINGDOM GREATLY INCREASED

VANCOUVER. April 27. - Canadian exports to Japan during 1926 increased by \$11,951,480, as compared with the previous year, according to figures released here by the Japanese consulate. Japan is now Canada's third best customer. Canadian wheat and lumber accounted for the greater part of the

Exports from Canada to Japan during the year amounted to \$37,192,459. of which wheat and flour totalled \$15 .-767,929, an increase of \$5,909,867. Lumber and allied products were exported to the value of \$8,242,121, as compared with \$5,463,089 during the previous year. Zinc and lead formed the third largest item exported.

The market for Canadian butter and beef has also improved while trade in cheese and condensed milk also show large gains, trade in the latter developing from \$553 in 1925 to \$167,735 for the past year.

Imports into Canada from Japan show the largest increase in textiles, fibres and other products, these increasing from \$5,438,351 in 1925 to \$7,-308,462 last year. Silk cloth, woven and imported for the purpose of being dyed and finished in Canada was imported to the value of \$2,588,455, an increase of approximately one million and a quarter dollars over last year.
