INCREASE OF NEWSPAPERS

FOR SECOND TIME SINCE THE POST-
WAR DECREASE

NEW YORK, March 21.—Increase in
the number of newspapers in the United
States is taking place for the second
time since the post-war decrease.

An analysis of the publication field,
contained in the 1927 edition of the
American Newspaper Annual and Directory,
shows that 1924 and 1926 are the
only years since the war which were
not marked by a drop in the number of
publications.

The directory at present lists 22,000.
In 1917 the number reached a peak of
24,068 and then fell off steadily. One
year since the war showed a net de-
crease of 1,178.

The country weekly has been the
leader in the downward trend. Rural
publications, and directory states, were
confronted with increased commodity
prices attendant upon the war but
failed to profit by the added interest of
the daily news during that period.
