**FORMER LOCAL LAWYER HAS CHARGE OF CASE MILLERD INTERESTS**

Damage Suit Now Pending is for \$70,000 for Wrongful Seizure of Floating Cannery and Salmon

W. E. Williams of the firm of Williams, Manson & Gonzales was acting on behalf of the Somerville Cannery Co. when it won its case against the Dominion Fisheries Department before Magistrate Alexander and again before Mr. Justice Macdonald in Vancouver.

Mr. Williams is also on behalf of the same client bringing action for wrongful seizure of the floating cannery Laurel Whalen and for seizure of canned salmon on the dock at Prince Rupert and is claiming \$70,000. This case will likely be taken to the highest courts.

Mr. Williams was for many years a resident of Prince Rupert and is well known to most people here.

Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. Went Adrift Near Lucy Id. When Bearing Burned Out

While towing two scows laden with camp outfits from Dundas Island, the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.'s fish packer and towboat Chief Zibassa burned out her bearings on Saturday morning and went adrift near Triple Island. Word of her plight being brought to the city, the company boat Chief Legal and the Rupert Marine Products gasoline tug Tide Rip repaired to the scene about noon Saturday and returned about 4 o'clock Sunday morning with the broken down outfit safely in tow.

**MOTORSHIP LILLEHORN RETURNS TO ENGLAND**

Sailing October 4, Will be First Vessel of Season to Load Full Vancouver Grain Cargo

M.S. Lillehorn, which came out to this coast from the Old Country two years ago and last year, under charter to the Canadian National Coast Steamships, was engaged in coast freighting with Capt. Dan McKinnon in command, will sail from Vancouver on October 4, returning to her English owners, Hobbs, Bros. Ltd. Incidentally the Lillehorn will be the first vessel of the season to load full from Vancouver with wheat, taking a cargo of 1400 tons to the United Kingdom.

**PRINCE JOHN BRINGS MUCH ISLAND SALMON**

Holds of Prince John Bulging With Cargo Loaded on Queen Charlottes

Her holds bulging with a cargo of 540 tons of canned salmon loaded at Queen Charlotte Island cannery points, C.N.R. steamer Prince John, Capt. E. Mabbs, arrived in port at 12 midnight last night from Vancouver via the Islands. She is discharging the whole quantity here today for shipment south on other vessels of the line. Tonight at midnight, the Prince John will sail making a call at Wales Island to load salmon before proceeding on her regular run to Vancouver via the Islands.
