

Grain was never sold. It was bought. There was no efficiency in individualism. At a certain point in development the individual began to give way to co-operation in the industrial classes and thus the manufacturers' association was formed. They had been trying to destroy each other but found co-operation better than competition.

The labor class also organized to a certain extent so the farmer was left alone and the result was that the price of farm products dropped. The farmer had no efficiency in selling. When he took his wheat to the elevator he did not set the price but took what the
