KING FUAD OF EGYPT PLANS VISIT ENGLAND

WILL BE GUEST OF KING GEORGE AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE AND VISIT COTTON MILLS

LONDON, May 18.—King Fuad of Egypt will visit King George at Buckingham Palace in July, staying with His Majesty for three days after arriving on July 4. He will visit Bolton, Lancashire, for the celebrations of the centenary of the death of Samuel Crompton, and behind this visit is a real touch of romance. The Egyptian king is going to the great cotton manufacturing centre to honor the memory of a poor inventor, dead 100 years who revolutionized the cotton industry, made fortunes possible for countless other people, and helped the forward march of the Egyptian cotton fields. Crompton's invention was the spinning mule.

Bolton is making plans for an impressive centenary, and King Fuad will attend the celebrations on behalf of Egypt.

Most of the cotton grown in Egypt finds its way to the Bolton mills, and when the International Cotton Congress was held in Cairo last January the King of Egypt was invited to visit the Lancashire town so vitally associated with Egyptian cotton. King Fuad was proclaimed king of Egypt in 1922, when the Protectorate terminated. Before that he was Sultan. At one time fear of the assassin's bullet kept him virtually a prisoner in his palace.

EGYPT'S MARKET

It is claimed that practically every pound of cotton now grown in Egypt finds its way into the Bolton mills. The production of these mills goes out to all parts of the world. It is estimated that the home market requirements can be satisfied by the running of all the Bolton mills for two days a week, the rest of the week's production being exported.

Apart from the 120 mills engaged in spinning—Swan-lane is the largest spinning mill in the world—some 70 firms are at work on the manufacture

LITTLE CHANGE IN REGULATIONS

OPEN SEASONS FOR BIG GAME IN BRITISH COLUMBIA FIXED BY AUTHORITIES

VICTORIA, May 18.—The directors of big game in British Columbia this year are fixed in regulations issued following their approval by the cabinet on recommendation of the game conservation board. Simplified by the division of the province into two game districts, one west of the Cascade Mountains and one east of that range, the regulations make little change in the actual seasons allowed for the shooting of big game.

In the eastern district, male moose are open from September 10 to December 15; in Omineca riding, north of the Canadian National Railway, from October 1 to October 31.

Male caribou may be killed from September 1 to December 15 in the eastern district, except in Mackenzie and Skeena ridings, and that part of the Cariboo west of the Fraser River and the territory south of the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

The open seasons on male mountain sheep will be from September 1 to November 15 in the eastern district to the north of the Canadian National Railway and in those parts of Cariboo and Lillooet south of the fifty-second parallel of latitude and west of the Fraser. In Fernie, Cranbrook and Columbia the season will be open from October 1 to October 31.

Mountain goat may be killed in the eastern district from September 1 to December 15, except in a large area bounded by the international boundary on the south, the Canadian Pacific Railway on the north, the Columbia River on the east and the Fraser River watershed on the west. A reserve is created here to protect mountain goat recently imported from Alberta.

In the eastern district bear may be shot from September 1, 1927, to June 30, 1928, but no bear may be trapped.

Mule, white tail and coast deer are open from September 1 to December 15 in the eastern district, except white tail deer in Northwest Okanagan and Similkameen, and in Grand Forks-Greenwood, west of the summit of the midway mountains.

Bag limits are as follows: In the eastern district two male deer and in the western district three male deer; all over the province two grizzly bears and three bear of any other species; two mountain sheep north of the Canadian National Railway and one sheep in Fernie, Columbia and Cranbrook, and in Cariboo and Lillooet south of the 52nd parallel and west of the Fraser, north of the Canadian National line, two caribou, and south of that line one elk, one moose and two mountain goat.

FRANCE WILL NOT FORGET

MARSHAL FOCH PAYS TRIBUTE TO BRITISH ARMIES IN CONNECTION WITH LATE WAR

PARIS, May 18.—Marshal Foch, speaking at a dinner of the Paris branch of the British Legion, said that, after the bravery of the Allied troops, what had done more than anything else to win the war was the mutual confidence of their leaders and the fact that those leaders had sacrificed their personal views so as to reach an understanding at all costs.

Today, he said, the artificers of the peace would make the peace a glorious one if, like the fighting men, they sought before all and above all to understand one another.

Marshal Foch, after paying a cordial tribute to the energy and tenacity of the British armies, enumerated the following "succession of victories won by them in the final months of the war:—

Altogether, said Marshal Foch, the contribution of the British Empire to the final victory meant a loss of 47,000 officers and 946,000 men, exclusive of native contingents. "We shall not forget it," he concluded.


During the dinner the guests rose and sang the Froth Blowers' anthem in honor of the gallant marshal, who was somewhat mystified until the origin of the song was explained to him.
