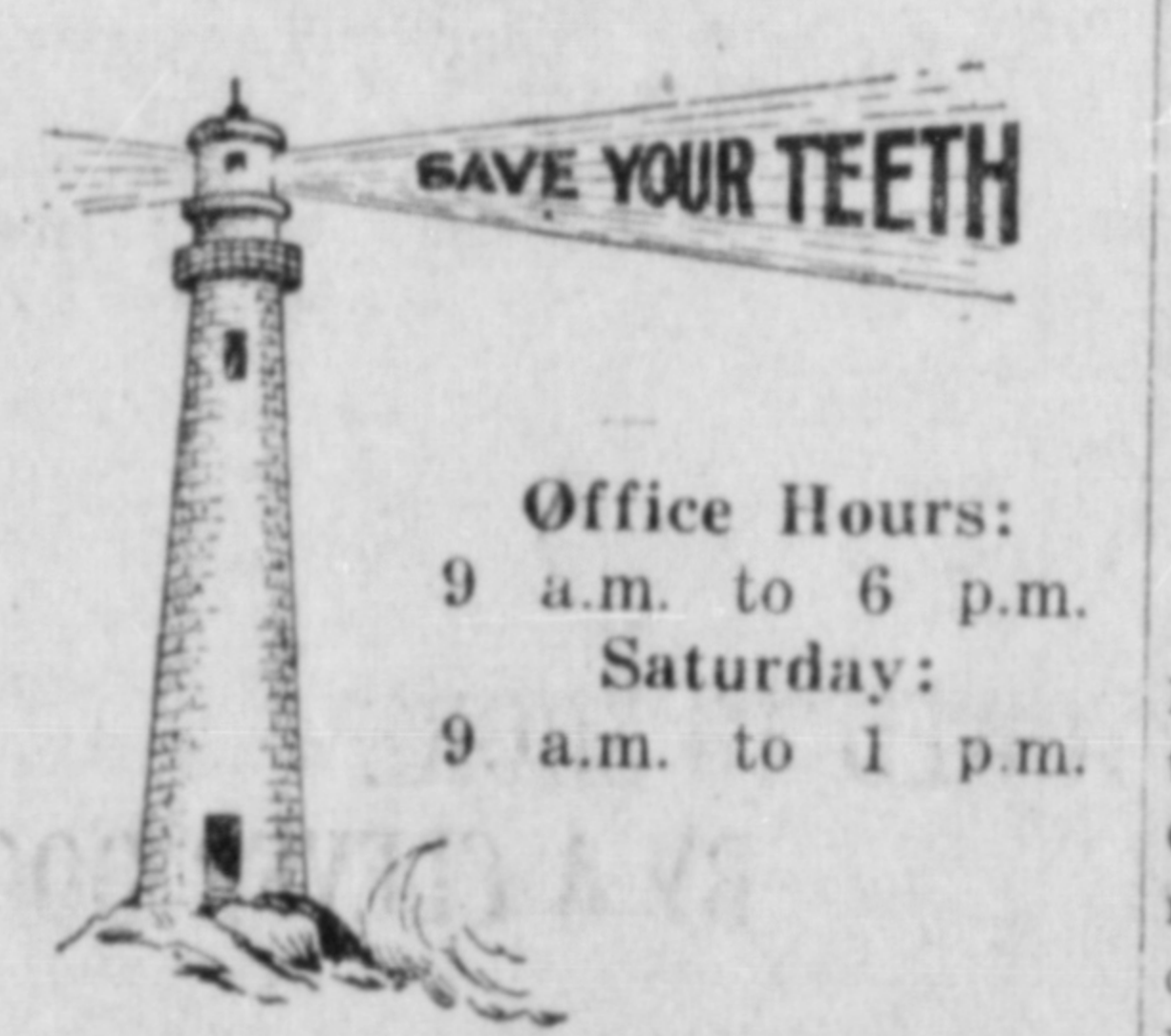

CONFERENCE CALLED INTERNATIONAL AIR MAIL AT THE HAGUE

WASHINGTON, D.C., July 28.—A conference on international air mail has been called by the International Postal Union to be held at The Hague on September 1.

Twenty-five or more countries have signified their intention of sending delegates. Representatives of the leading aircraft companies of the world are expected to attend.

Temporary agreements will be entered into by the delegates, to remain in force until the recommendations agreed upon are submitted to and acted upon by the next congress of the Universal Postal Union, which is to meet in London in 1929.

STEWART TELLS ABOUT DUNWELL

General Meeting of Company to be Held About August 10 it is Announced

VICTORIA, July 28.—Results of diamond-drilling and other exploratory work at the Dunwell mine indicating the extent of ore bodies already known will be presented to shareholders at the general meeting of the company to be called for about August 10, it was announced by R. M. Stewart, president of the Dunwell, on his return to Victoria from the mine at Stewart, B.C.

Mr. Stewart did not make public details, but he indicated results by saying:

"We have never yet drilled or diamond-drilled for a lead on the Dunwell and failed to get it. We are just getting started on finding out what the property holds and I may say that for the next twenty years we will be finding new ledges on the Dunwell property."

Mr. Stewart said that the mill is now running through about 150 tons a day, which is fifty tons a day more than the mill was designed for. The power plant is handling this extra load as easily as it was handling 100 tons a day, now that the mill has been broken in. All the engineering parties which have visited the mill since it got into operation have commented favorably on the efficiency of the installation.

"The mill is now producing thirty tons of concentrates a day," Mr. Stewart went on. "Of this production, twenty tons are zinc concentrates, and ten tons lead, carrying the gold and silver values. The gold values alone equal the combined values of the lead and silver."

Of the new Ben All strike, Mr. Stewart declared it to be one of the finest showings he had ever seen.

"We have now got this strike open cut for 300 feet vertical depth and 500 feet horizontal length," he said. "We hope to get it down at the foot of the hill, which is 500 feet below the last open cut and three-quarters of a mile from the mill. We are starting to drive a tunnel, drifting in the ore. The ore comes out on the face of the mountain and no cross-cutting has to be done to get it, as we drift in the ore from the start. The vein throughout carries a good grade of ore, with very high-grade gold values."

"The diamond drilling programme has been started and will be carried on all summer, running twenty-four hours a day."

"The auxiliary hydro-electric plant is completed and is now operating. This effects a considerable saving in power costs."

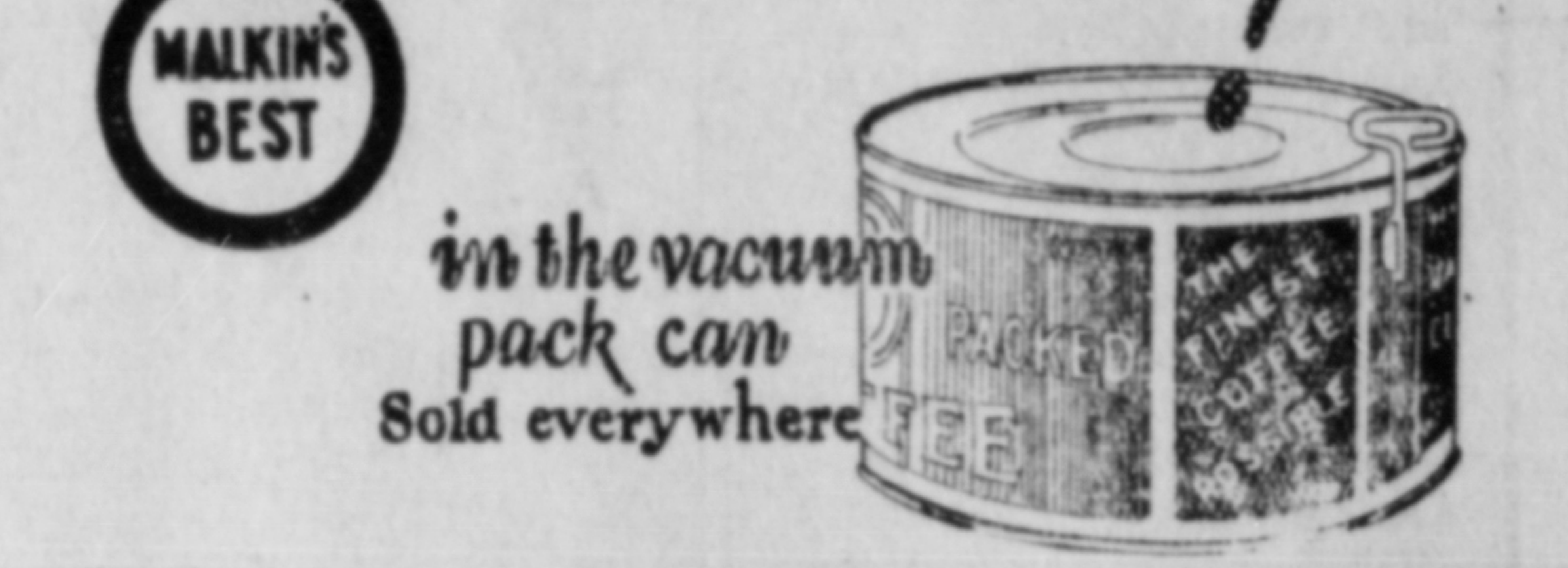

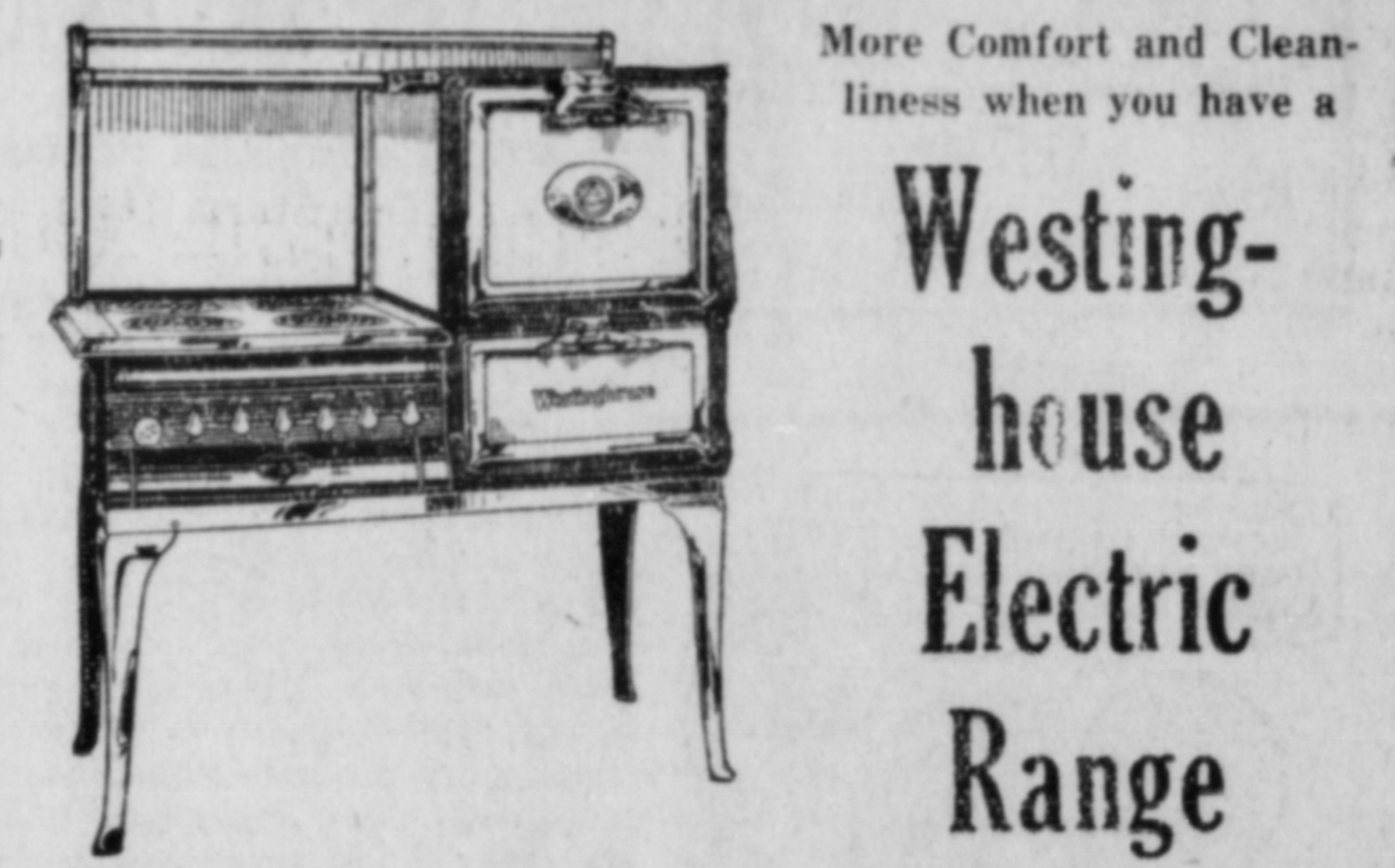
