JUNIOR SOCCER LEAGUE OPENED

BOOTH SCHOOL BEAT BORDEN STREET IN GOOD MATCH ON SATURDAY AFTERNOON

The opening game of the Junior Football League season took place on Saturday afternoon between the old time rivals—Borden and Booth schools, the latter winning by 2 to 0. The teams lined up as follows:

Borden—Tom Steen, Albert Stiles, M. Larkin, Teddy Orne, Angus MacDonald, Mike Gurvich, K. Nakamoto, N. Gurvich, Jimmie Lee, Ed Batt, Roy Wicks. Booth—Douglas Scott, Fred Cameron, Rudolph Nelson, Roy Morrison, Tom Kelsey, Reg. Collison, Alex Walters, Henry Dickens, Bishop Thurber, Tony Bussanich, Oscar Wingham.

Borden won the toss and set Booth to play up-hill and against the sun and breeze. Booth took up the attack but Walters put behind. MacDonald set off his left wing but Cameron cleared and forced a corner from which MacDonald shot over. Cameron next robed Nina Gurvich. A spell of midfield play followed with MacDonald and Kelsey both prominent. Stiles cleared and Wicks made a nice run but sent behind. Lee and Wicks again got away but finished poorly. Dickens next threaded his way through the Borden team to finish up with a shot that Steen was glad to put over the bar. Booth was then pressing and Thurber and Kelsey had tries. The pressure continued and Wingham, Thurber and Bussanich combined beautifully for Bussanich to complete the movement with a fine shot to put Booth one goal up. Booth was in the ascendancy and Stiles cleared well and often. Steen fell in clearing a fine shot of Kelsey's but the defence scrambled the ball away. Lee tried to open up the game but Booth defence was sound. Lee again sent Wicks away to force a corner. Wicks' fine shot was headed away. Half time came with Booth a goal up.

Dickens was dangerous but the ball went behind. Stiles stopped Bussanich. A free kick just outside the penalty area looked bad for Borden and its defence was sorely tried to keep the goal intact. Mike Gurvich who played a fine game at left half relieved the pressure but Dickens was back and his long shot narrowly missed. Kelsey shot over. Steen cleared a fine overhead kick of Kelsey's that might have beaten many goalkeepers. It was nearly all Booth's game but the forwards shot poorly. MacDonald fouled Bussanich badly. At last Kelsey and Bussanich got Booth's second goal. Steen and Stiles defended well and Larkin did his share. Kelsey got through but handled the ball, unnoticed by the referee. Even then from under the bar he shot yards over. The game came to a close with Booth still on the aggressive but unable to add to the score.

For the opening game the class of football was good. With practice the boys will keep their places better and their combination will improve. Jack Campbell refereed efficiently, and D. H. Hartness and W. W. C. O'Neill were linesmen. Next Saturday's game will be between High School and Borden.

Criticism is said to have been directed against the way the press of this city has been reporting summer sports activities. It is understood that the matter was discussed at an annual meeting of one of the sports associations. The Daily News does not intend to take the defensive in such complaints which are presumptuous to say the least but a few observations may not be out of place before another season opens. In the first place, the editorial and reportorial staff of a paper is perhaps in a better position than those actively engaged and keenly interested in sports to judge what the mass of the public wants in the way of reports of games. While lengthy accounts of games might be of interest to some of the players and fans we do not believe they are to the large majority of our readers. It is safe to say, further, that not even the most of the participants and fans want such long reports. We would judge that one of the principal desires of those promoting sports is to have the write-ups attract interest in those sports so as

to swell the crowds and the gate receipts. Some people may believe that object would be accomplished by lengthy report but it is the opinion of the Daily News that short, concise reports that everyone will read go further in creating interest. Some people seem to think that the games are played for the newspaper reports and not for the fans who view them. That is an altogether fallacious belief. The Daily News wishes to be correct in its reports and, if mistakes are made, it will always be glad to have attention drawn to them. Co-operation is better than criticism and the sports organizations will always find the Daily News ready and willing to co-operate.

One of the most popular of summer pastimes is tennis. The rapid growth of this sport during the past few years in Canada has been remarkable. It is a game that is enjoyed by old and young alike, and it provides as much exercise and entertainment as some of the more strenuous pastimes. Tennis played by experts is a skillful contest, providing thrills and excitement for the spectator. While Canada has not yet produced a William Tilden or a Suzanne Lenglen in tennis, Canadian tennis stars have made creditable showings in the Davis Cup matches, the international competition for the world's amateur tennis championship. It is not being too optimistic to predict that within the next four or five years the Davis Cup may find a resting place in the Dominion for a season or two.

The Telkwa Jockey Club is busy completing the program of sports and racing for the May 24 celebration to be held on the barbecue grounds at that point. The program includes democrat races, horse races, pony races, slow race for Ford cars, tug-of-war by teams from different sections of the Valley, while a special feature will be a half-mile bicycle race for boys. At night there will be a big dance in the Town Hall and the committee in charge is busy with detailed plans to make it the biggest success possible.

If present plans mature, Canada will be the battleground for the three series in Davis Cup tennis play in the coming summer, one to be played in Toronto and two in Montreal. Negotiations are under way to have the Canadian-Cuban match staged in Canada, instead of Cuba, with Toronto as the scene. There is thought to be a very good chance that the Cubans will agree to this.

When sport fans go up to the Acropolis Hill grounds toward the end of this month for the first games of the season they will receive a pleasant surprise on viewing the great improvements that have been made by the city as a result of quiet but extensive work which has been going on there for the

past few months. Several thousand dollars has been expended and the rock pile, that has been such a nuisance to baseballers especially, will be a thing of the past. The additional thousand dollars that will be spent by the city, on the promise that it will be reimbursed by the Fair Board and the sports organization, will put the finishing touches to a sports field such as has long been the hope of players and fans alike.
