

Owing to over-production and decrease in the quantity of pulp-wood being used at the Powell River paper mill, the T. A. Kelley Logging Co. is curtailing its logging operations on the Queen Charlotte Islands for the time being. Some two hundred men have been on the payroll and half or more of these, it is understood, will be laid off. 
