PROFITS ON UTILITIES.

Editor, Daily News. Mr. Rorie's explanation of the earnngs of the Utilities in the yesterday's aper was much appreciated. It still leaves matters somewhat hazy, how-

According to Mr. Rorie, the Utilities made a profit of \$6,680, while the Provincial Inspector of Municipalities says they made a loss of \$4,734. The difference between these two authorities is, then, \$11,414. Mr. Rorie explains this as the result of his giving effect to cross entries, quoting in part the Inspector's note, the whole text of which is as follows: "The figures subnitted under the heading of "Receipts" "Expenditures" are prepared very ely from an analysis of the audiors' reports, and although the classiication of expenditures is not uniform n the different municipalities, and it is in many cases extremely difficult to nake a distribution of the items, yet he statements have been prepared with a good deal of care and may be taken as substantially correct. Items which are of the nature of cross-entries, deposit accounts, and trust acnflating the figures, have as far as cossible been eliminated."
