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PRESBYTERIAN PROPERTY IS DIVIDED

GRAIN MOVEMENT HERE HEAVIER THAN ANTICIPATED

United Church Awarded Largest Percentage of Holdings Left at Union

ASSETS TOTALLING \$10,500,000. CONTINUING BODY GETS
BUT THIRTY-ONE PER CENT IN COMMISSION'S
ORDER

TORONTO, April 20.—The properties of the Presbyterian church in Canada from coast to coast and the pension funds of the church are divided between the non-concurring Presbyterians and United Church in an order of the Dominion church property commission. Slightly more than twenty-two percent of the total assets and pension funds are to be handed over to the non-concurring congregations and the continuing church also receives the charters of Knox College and the Presbyterian College at Montreal, two of the central colleges of the church, together with about \$550,000 of assets of the two colleges. It is estimated that, out of assets amounting approximately \$10,500,000 held by the Presbyterian Church in Canada, property and funds valued at \$3,261,000, or about thirty-one per cent, are awarded to the non-concurring Presbyterians.

FAMOUS BANDIT BELIEVED HERE

AMERICAN AUTHORITIES HAVE
SUSPECTED THAT OHIO MURDERER
AND ROBBER HAS BEEN
ACTIVE

VANCOUVER, April 20.—Victims of bank robbers during the past few weeks have been at New Westminster, according to the police, have identified the suspect of John Leslie, wanted in Ohio for murder and robbery, as one of the men who visited their offices shortly before the safes were robbed.

Eugene Watson and David Willis, Leslie's alleged partners in crime in the States, were not his companions in British Columbia's burglaries, according to the authorities who have word that they were killed in fight with police at Longbeach, B.C., nearly two weeks ago. It is, however, that Leslie is still at large. The last of his "jobs" was the hold-up of the Capitol in Victoria.

SEIZURE WAS ILLEGAL ONE

U. S. JUDGE MAKES RULING IN
FEDERAL SHIP CASE

SAN FRANCISCO, April 20.—Federal Judge Bourquin today ruled as illegal the seizure by the United States of the rum vessel Federal Ship with its million dollar cargo and the arrest of the captain and crew.

The Federal Ship was captured four hundred miles off the California coast about a month ago by the United States coastguard. The captain and crew were placed under arrest and the vessel towed into this port.

SEVERE FIGHTING ON RUSS-ROUMANIAN LINE


Many Reportedly Dead and Wounded

OPERATION OF ALBERTA WHEAT POOL'S PRINCE RUPERT TERMINAL ELEVATOR



The Alberta Wheat Pool has loaded twenty-two ships with wheat from the 1926 crop at Prince Rupert and expects to bring the total up to twenty-four before the crop movement is ended this spring.

The Alberta Pool terminal at Rupert has already handled 5,188,000 bushels and the total will reach 5,788,000 bushels within a few weeks. This is a larger total than was anticipated last fall.

The Prince Rupert house was built and is owned by the Canadian Government, has a capacity of 1,250,000 bushels and is probably the fastest handling terminal on the coast. It is under lease to the Alberta Pool for a term of two years. Joseph Bennett is superintendent of this elevator.

Through the Pool's extensive operation, the ocean freight differential has disappeared and grain is shipped to Europe from Prince Rupert at the same rate as from Vancouver.

Of the twenty-four ships already loaded or committed, six carried grain to the Orient and eighteen to Europe.

Previous to the Pool leasing the Rupert terminal, no wheat had been shipped from this port.

Educational Facilities Have Increased Greatly in British Columbia During Recent Years

VICTORIA, April 20.—During the past seven years, the bill of the government and the municipalities for education in British Columbia has jumped from \$4,200,000 to \$8,300,000. Dr. S. J. Willis, superintendent of education, told the British Columbia Teachers' Federation at its annual convention here yesterday. In the same seven years, the superintendent said, the teaching staff had advanced from 2,300 persons to 3,400 and school attendance had increased forty-seven per cent.

Dr. Willis advocated an early and general adoption of the system of junior high schools, considering that the municipalities would be justified in incurring the expense that would be involved.

He predicted that the time was rapidly approaching when financial aid would have to be extended by the government to small municipalities and rural districts where the tax rate for schools was now excessive.

REHEARING OF QUADRA CASE

WILL BE ASKED IN SUPREME
COURT AT WASHINGTON, D.C.,
IT IS ANNOUNCED

SAN FRANCISCO, April 20.—Attorneys for the officers and crew of the Canadian rum runner Quadra have informed United States District Attorney Hartfield that a motion for the rehearing of the criminal conspiracy proceeding will be filed shortly before the Supreme Court in Washington, D.C. The Quadra's captain and crew of twenty-two men were convicted on dry law charges here in 1924 and a recent Supreme Court ruling upheld the findings of the local court.

United States Fishermen Are Warned to Comply with Rules Under International Treaty

SEATTLE, April 20.—Fishermen from the United States were warned on Tuesday by the Bureau of Fisheries to comply strictly with the provision of the treaty between Canada and the United States relating to the fisheries which provides that American fishermen shall not visit Canadian ports unless to seek shelter from severe weather or urgent necessity and that no supplies shall be purchased there other than food and water. The Canadian government alleges that United States fishermen visit ports of Vancouver Island when not compelled to do so by unfavorable weather or necessary repairs and, by doing so, render themselves liable to preventative measures such as the seizure of their boats.

PRODUCTION OF MINES GROWING

IN TWO WEEKS RECENTLY NEARLY
8,000 TONS WAS SHIPPED FROM
ANYOX AND STEWART

In a recent two weeks no less than 1,200 tons of copper from the Granby smelter and 6,601 tons of ore and concentrates from Stewart went south on three freighters of the Coastwise Steamship & Barge Co. These tonnage figures give some idea of the output of the Granby Co. at Anyox and the Premier mine at Stewart which were the principal contributors to the cargoes.

In April 5, the steamer McGill left Anyox with one of the most valuable cargoes ever shipped south. She had on board 848 tons of Anyox copper, 3187 tons of Premier ore and concentrates and 214 tons of Dunwell concentrates.

The Anyox on April 7 loaded 1,300 tons of Premier ore at Stewart and 250 tons of copper at Anyox and left for Vancouver towing the scow Griffon loaded with 70,000 gallons of tar.

The Amur arrived at Anyox on April 11 from Stewart loaded with 1,900 tons of ore and concentrates. She loaded 300 tons of copper at Anyox and left for Seattle.

SEVEN KILLED TRAIN WRECK

DEAD IN CRASH NEAR HORNE
PAYNE, ONTARIO, YESTERDAY
ARE NOW IDENTIFIED

TORONTO, April 20.—The death list as a result of the derailment of a Canadian National Railway freight train near Horne Payne on Tuesday totals seven, according to an official statement. The dead, in addition to Engineer Pevey, Fireman Gourley and Lorne Wilkins, stockman, are Capt. J. L. Liddington of Ottawa, son of Major Liddington; Garnett Bull of Thames, England; H. Endersley of England, and Patrick Broderick of Ottawa. The condition of R. Colbeck, brakeman, is critical.

Three of the cars were filled with race horses owned by Major Liddington.

A washout, following a heavy downpour of rain during the night, is believed to have caused the engine and tender and nineteen cars to leave the rails and be thrown down a forty-foot embankment.

DECIDE AGAINST HUDSON BAY CO.

GOLD AND SILVER FOUND ORIGINALLY GRANTED LANDS BELONG TO CROWN, TIS RULED

OTTAWA, April 20.—The Supreme Court of Canada unanimously decided today that gold and silver found in lands that were part of the original grant to the Hudson's Bay Company belong to the crown.

The court also decided that Section 17 of the Alberta Act was not ultra vires. The question of the validity of the section arose in a reference to the court in connection with Alberta's natural resources.
