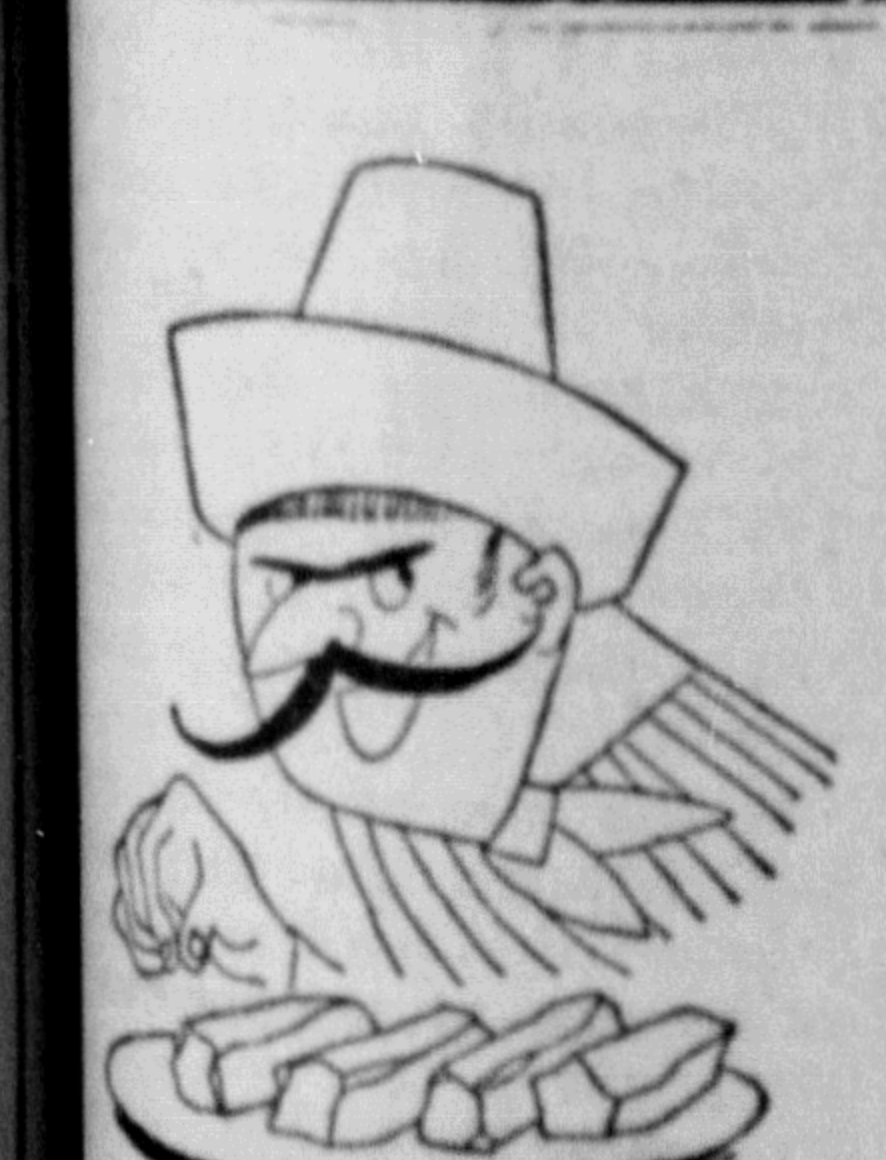

Four seats on the Village Commission are to be filled when election day comes around on Dec. 11 and so far there is only one candidate definitely in the field. He is Commissioner Sam Kirkaldy who is running for re-election. Dudley Little is the only commissioner whose term is not up this year. Nomination day is Dec. 4.

PRINCE GEORGE

With a civic election dated for Dec. 11, three candidates have identified their intention to run. Aldermen Harold Assman and Jack Aitken will seek re-election and the third is a newcomer, Otto E. Leboe, a steam engineer at Prince George Planing Mills. Alderman Assman has already served three terms, and Alderman Aitken has served one.

In the election, voters will decide on a referendum concerning the Civic Centre which reads: "Shall the city council take over the property under lease by the Civic Centre Association and improve same?" It is estimated that initial improvement costs will be about \$45,000.

Tenders are to be called for construction of a \$200,000 extension to the Prince George Hotel. The work, which will nearly double the hotel's capacity, is made necessary by shortage of hotel accommodation in the city.

St. Andrew's Celebrated By City Scots

A dinner meeting to mark St. Andrew's Day was held in the Legion Auditorium on Saturday night with about 100 persons in attendance.

Departing from the usual custom, ladies, wives and friends of members were invited.

After the dinner, a half-hour program of Scots music was heard from records loaned by CFPR.

Hon. vice-president J. Frew welcomed guests and in a witty speech explained the reason why the Burns Club was traditionally confined to men only, but "on this occasion they were making history in inviting the ladies" to whom his welcome was especially addressed.

Membership in these clubs is not limited to people of Scottish birth or descent, said Mr. Frew. "They are open to people of goodwill recognizing the spirit of Robert Burns and appreciating his works and principles."

Past president R. Cameron, in a short address, outlined the aims and objects of the club, purpose of the Burns Federation and the conditions and requirements for membership. He also spoke of Burns' love of humanity and his fellow men.

The president, James Nicoll, speaking on St. Andrew, told of the Saint's association with Christ, his crucifixion in the year 60 AD, and of the conveying of his remains to Scotland, where they are buried in the city of St. Andrew.

Solos were sung by Mrs. Crawford and W. Smith accompanied by Mrs. W. Smith at the piano. Mrs. R. Cameron gave an excellent reading from Sir Walter Scott.

Music for the dances was provided by Mrs. J. Halerow and J. Bremner. St. Pipers J. Robertson and J. Ewart played for the Grand March and for several of the other dances.

The evening closed to the strains of "Auld Lang Syne."

First Year of Terrace Hospital Reviewed by Gracious Community

TERRACE.—Terrace and District Hospital Association celebrated its first birthday Nov. 30, and sharing the honors was little Margery Hobenshield, first baby born in the hospital Dec. 1, 1952, approximately one hour after the hospital was taken over by the community.

Deeds and keys were officially turned over by S. L. Hewer, assistant commissioner of Terrace Red Cross Hospital, to George McAdam representing the Terrace and District Hospital Association, at a reception in the nurses' lounge of the hospital a year ago.

Said Mr. McAdam at a recent meeting: "Many will recall conditions before we had a hospital in Terrace. Incidents such as the time a child, held in the arms of a nurse all the way, was rushed by speeder to Prince Rupert Hospital in the midst of winter. Or the times men hurt at work lay on the grass on the streets of Terrace receiving first aid at the hands of those available, because the only doctor was attending another case. Remembering things like that makes us thankful to have a hospital here and three doctors available."

Terrace hospital was taken over by the community after a successful fund-raising campaign to meet initial operating costs, and much has been done since that time by individuals and organizations to give all possible aid to the successful operation of this hospital.

Building alterations started in February to convert the 10-bed hospital to a 25-bed capacity. Several carpenters offered their free services for an entire day at a time.

When alterations were complete, groups of people met for painting bees.

The Women's Auxiliary to the hospital is constantly working for the welfare of hospital patients and staff, and are putting aside \$100 a year toward a new and modern hospital of the future.

Rebekah Lodge is making the Nursery their project and have worked and donated money as well as painted the walls and ceiling of the ward.

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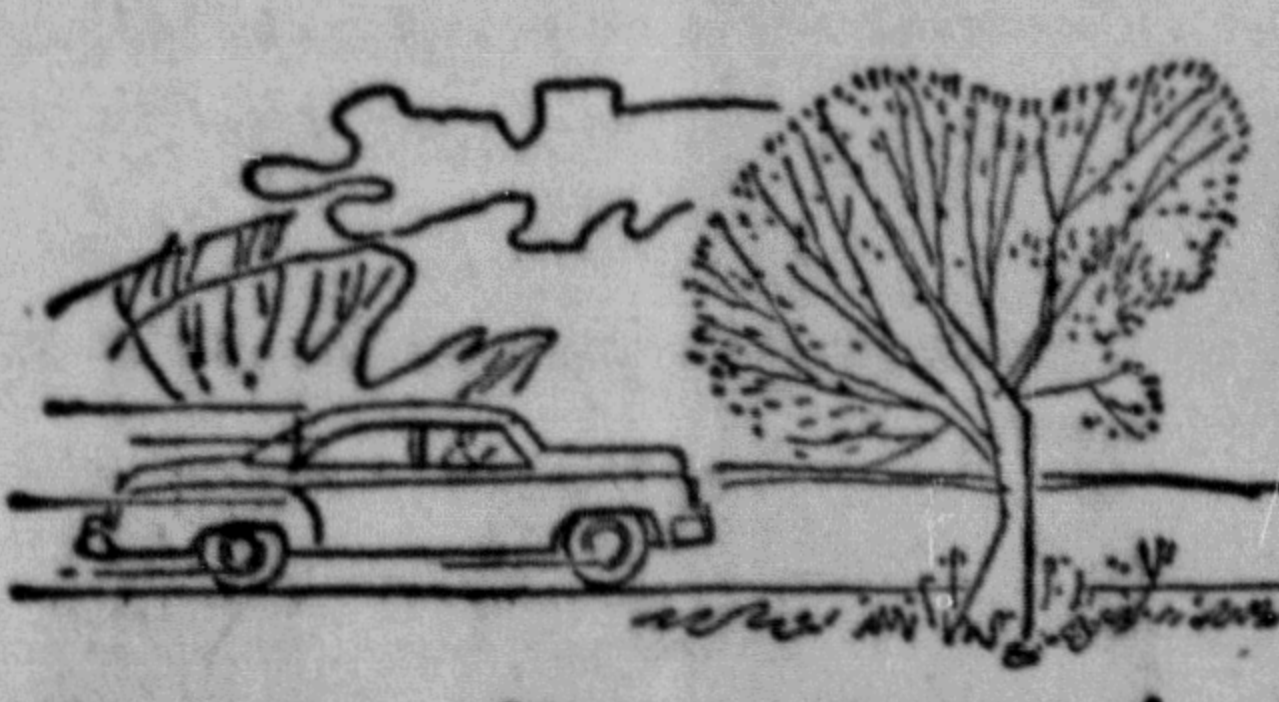

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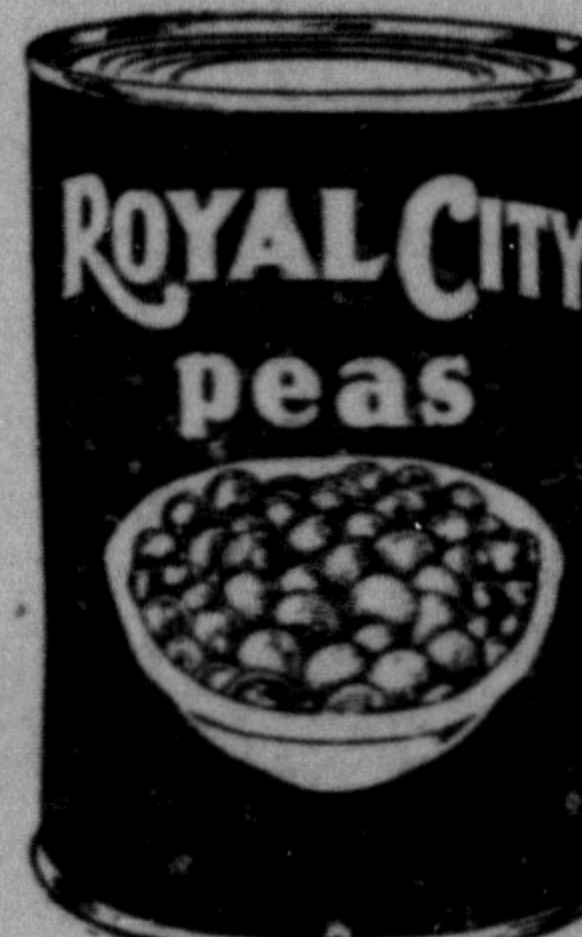
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
