PIONEER RESIDENT OF INTERIOR LOSES LIFE IN SKEENA RIVER BY WHICH HE LIVED SO LONG

Though the body was not found, the police have admitted that drowned recently in the Skeena River The Omineca Herald writes as follows:

There was general regret and real sorrow felt when it was learned that James Daines Wells, popularly known as "Jimmy" Wells of Usk was the victim of an accidental drowning accident Christmas Eve.

Deceased had been at a dance that evening and had left about a quarter to twelve, and presumably he started across the Skeena in the row boat now used as a ferry.
