CANADA PLEASES WOMEN MIGRANTS

CORRESPONDENCE RECEIVED BY C.N.R. IS COMPLIMENTARY RATHER THAN CRITICAL

MONTREAL, Dec. 4.—It frequently happens that when new-comers to Canada take pen in hand to express their views, strangeness of surroundings and differing methods lead them to express criticism rather than write compliments. Miss Mabel Durham, Superintendent Woman's Branch, Department of Colonization, Agriculture and Natural Resources, Canadian National Railways, writing from London to Dr. W. J. Black, the director, at Montreal, has a happier experience to relate, and with her report to the Director has forwarded a series of letters from women who migrated to Canada and found conditions entirely to their liking.

During the season Miss Durham came in contact with a large number of women who left the British Isles to take up domestic and farm-domestic work in the Dominion, and of the 800 who travelled across the Atlantic and proceeded to destinations indicated by the Canadian National Railways, all were satisfactorily placed and many of these women have since written to Miss Durham. "I do like Canada well," writes one, who adds "I am in a nice home." "I am in a good situation," states another, adding "it's just like being at home here and the people are so nice. I like it better than England, and I am right glad I came to Canada."

SPLENDID SITUATIONS

Again: "I have got a splendid situation here in Calgary and I like it very much and I only wish I had come out to Canada a few years ago. You feel more free here and everyone is so kind to you. It is quite different to the Old Country."

Another writing from Edmonton reporting a pleasant situation where the comforts of the staff are looked after concludes: "The railway journey was most interesting, wonderful forest and prairie scenery. I thought the system for meeting and helping travellers very efficient; one is so glad of it in a new country." "It is very nice here and I like the farm," writes a newcomer from Saskatchewan. Another after praising the hostels at Montreal and Toronto states: "Although I have been in Canada only a short time I do not think I shall want to settle in England again."

"The ways are a bit different, but one gets accustomed to them," writes a correspondent from Hamilton thanking Miss Durham for help and courtesy. "I am comfortably settled," is a recurring phrase.

There is one enthusiastic letter from a man who writes to thank Miss Durham for the kindness shown by Canadian National Railway officials. "I can assure you the way the officials care for the wives and families, no person should ever need to worry over the trip to Canada, and I also hope you will have the pleasure of sending plenty of English blood into this nice country, which is great."

All the letters are of like tenor and all indicate appreciation and contentment with Canadian life and conditions.
