



SEATTLE, January 4.-How Seattle police and other law enforcement officers aided the army of bootleggers, moonshiners and rum runners in supplying Seattle's thirsty with contraband liquor has finally been revealed through a succession of grand jury infictments by the federal government.

He is reputed to have acted as a rusted lieutenant under Olmsted and to have directed the landing of cargoes. to have paid off various police guards and others high in official life.



The trees are shipped long distances to supply the demand of he larger cities and in some cases where the supply is not sufficient to meet the demand Christmas tree nurseries have been started.
