MUST NOT RUN WATER PIPES

Residents of Prince Rupert will be given two more weeks to see that exposed water pipes are covered and, at the expiry of that time, if it is found that taps are still being allowed to run to prevent freezing, the water will be shut off forthwith. Such was the decision of the city council last night following the receipt of reports that a shortage of water supply for the city was impending and that, accordingly, no waste could be permitted.

The matter was brought up when Wilfrid Gratton appeared before the city council protesting that water supply to some of his houses should be cut off because taps were allowed to run when such practice was general throughout the city. The premises referred to, it was pointed out, were shacks on Second Avenue, west of the junction, where pipes were exposed.

Ald. Perry pointed out that, in summertime, precautions were taken to guard against a waste and shortage of water. In winter time, there was even greater fire risk and, if the present weather kept on, there would soon be a shortage which might make it impossible to fight fires unless the strictest of economy was observed. Notices had been published and the people had been given all summer to have their pipes protected. Eighty per cent of the cases had been met but a few had not complied with the warning. This was a case where the public was to be taken care of and, no matter how much any individual might be paying in taxes, that did not make it any the more right for him to break the law. He suggested that two weeks' more time be given and, if the water was still allowed to run, then it should be cut off.

This was seconded by Ald. W. J. Greer.

Mr. Gratton signified his willingness of taking the necessary precautions but he wanted to be assured that everyone else was doing the same.

Ald. W. J. Greer pointed out that the co-operation of all citizens in this matter was desired. No discrimination, in favor of or against any person or persons was proposed.

City Engineer H. A. McLean pointed out that the department was trying to be fair in the matter. Mr. Gratton had been warned but he had failed to do the necessary work.


