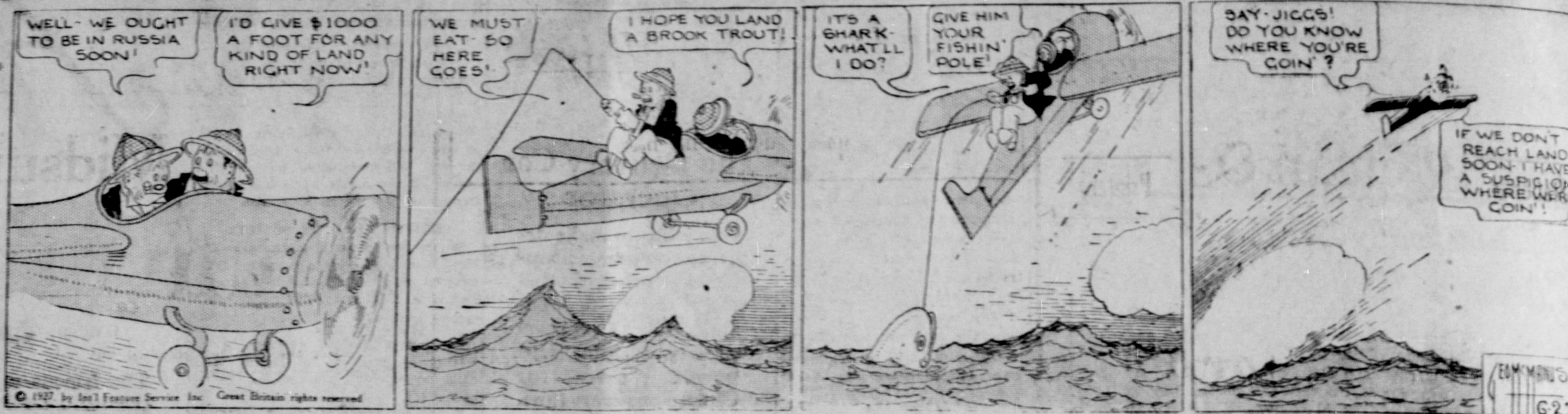

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DR. S. F. TOLMIE SPEAKS TO GOOD SIZED AUDIENCE MAKES GOOD IMPRESSION

(continued from page one)

A. Mann, president of the Prince Rupert Conservative Association, and the only other speaker was J. C. Brady, M.P. The self-nominated "Conservative" candidate at the next provincial election in support of Dr. Tolmie and the Conservative cause was conspicuous by his absence and, in that connection, Dr. Tolmie had a few interesting words to say which amounted to a repudiation of Mayor Newton's candidature as far as being the official representative of the Conservative party in Prince Rupert riding was concerned. The meeting opened with the singing of the Weir version of "O Canada" and closed with the National Anthem. Mrs. R. P. Ponder presided at the piano and rendered selections as the audience was forming itself.

J. C. BRADY SPEAKS

Mr. Brady was very earnest and dramatic, showing that he has not yet by any means lost the enthusiasm of the beginner in politics. Very eloquently he told how Dr. Tolmie was a son of the soil, one of a race of British Columbia pioneers, a man's man and a patriot for his native province. Much of the agricultural progress of Canada was attributable to him and his personal success had been profound. "The gates must be opened," declared Mr. Brady "We have lived long, too long, without following the way that points to better days. Surely some of us must believe that there are yet left men who have not been contaminated, that there are still honest men among us who place the welfare of their country above the petty political interest. In all Canada can be found no man whose heart is so much in harmony with your ideals and mine. I refer to Dr. Tolmie who has given his unequivocal denial to the charge of playing politics and who has said that for twenty years he has possessed himself and no man could buy him. The people of British Columbia today demand integrity and honor of their public men—men whose aims are above the practice of party politics and men whose vision is rather for a prosperous people, living in peace and harmony.

DR. TOLMIE

Dr. Tolmie, whose address was abundant with humorous passages and who thus kept his audience in the best of good humor, expressed his pleasure at again being able to address a Prince Rupert audience. He related how it had come that he was leader of the Conservative party in British Columbia. He had gone to Kamloops, resolute in his determination not to take the office but, when the convention had become derailed with the prospect of an abortive ending, he had finally realized it was his duty to sacrifice his personal desires and accept the leadership. He also made it clear that he was a chair-warmer for no man. He had never been such, and had no intention of starting at this time in life. "I propose to throw every ounce of my weight into the fight," said the speaker. "As long as the Conservative party desires my services, they can have them. When they get tired of me, all they have to do is tell me. There will be no long-drawn out farewells."

Dr. Tolmie referred in some detail to British Columbia's "better term" case, that is its fight to recover lands given to the Canadian Pacific Railway at the time of Confederation. He asserted that many Conservatives had participated and were participating strongly in that fight. Dunsmuir, Prior and McBride had been active and it was Mr. Twigg who had brought the matter before the legislature at Victoria while he (Dr. Tolmie) was working on it at Ottawa. As a result of their efforts, the Martin commission had been named. The speaker asserted that he had delegated Mr. Twigg to appear before that commission on behalf of him while it was sitting in Victoria but Mr. Twigg had been refused a hearing. He was told that if he had any evidence to give or any suggestions to make, they should come through the attorney. "At that, we retired in good order," asserted the speaker. "While we may not agree with the way the commission may be operating, I hope that British Columbia will receive justice. That British Columbia has a better case than the Maritimes, which received favorable treatment, I can certainly declare." The fight for better terms was not a political matter with his party, the doctor stated.

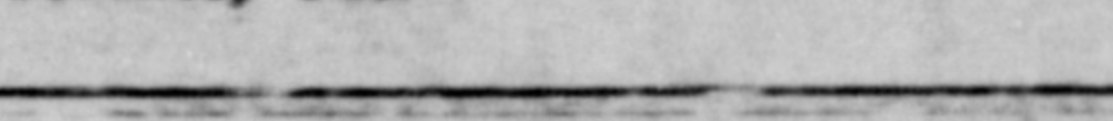

What lengthy description of British Columbia's great natural resources—its magnificent scenery, timber, fisheries, climate, farming possibilities, etc. In spite of this, British Columbia was only "wiggling along" while the state of Washington, for instance, far less richly endowed, was experiencing great prosperity and one city had a greater population than the whole vast province of British Columbia. What was the reason for the present situation? Was the government, giving the province efficient service? Dr. Tolmie then cited instances of alleged over-expenditure, mismanagement, bad judgment, etc. He referred to the construction of the Cariboo road, where he alleged over-expenditure and the Sumas project which he claimed was not an economic undertaking when there was plenty of land projecting above the surface of the water ready to be taken up; Merrville, which he dubbed an ill-conceived settlement scheme. "They seem to have a great time with the estimates," asserted the speaker. "As far as I have been able to find none of them ever made a mistake and were right yet. There was much waste and it all went to increase the cost of living in the province and made British Columbia, as it was today, the highest taxed province per capita in the Dominion. When the Liberal government had taken control ten years ago the province's net debt was \$9,000,000. Now it was \$80,000,000. "Now do you call that efficient management?" asked the doctor. "How long would you keep but a foreman who made such estimates?"

Are you going to have ten more years of it?"

Dr. Tolmie also alleged gross patronage in the matter of road work. One could not get a job unless he voted Liberal.

"They do the same in Prince Rupert, too," said a voice from the hall. In the matter of roads, the speaker said Prince Rupert was the only city of its size that had no road leading out of it. "It is only a matter of time before you must have a good road outlet leading to the interior so you may derive the benefit from the development of that country. In this matter an investigation should be made and the work done in one year if possible or, if not, as rapidly as practicable."

DEVELOPMENT OF PORT

As far as the development of the port was concerned Prince Rupert people could rest assured that he would give the matter the closest possible attention. He referred to the fact that he had supported Prince Rupert in its fight for an elevator, a project which he thought was well justified.

Speaking of the development of natural resources, the speaker dealt at some length with agriculture. He felt that attention should be given by the government to marketing conditions as well as production. He was favorable to the project of an experimental station in Central British Columbia.

Capital should be encouraged to come into the country, Dr. Tolmie said, but if it was to come, laws of the country must be stable.

Regarding immigration, Dr. Tolmie said he would first like to see the country in a position to give a good living to the people already here. Then, there would be nothing more beneficial than immigration for it would tend to divide up taxation and increase production.

As for freight rates, they should be as low as possible but the railway companies should be allowed to make a return.

The speaker urged the strictest economy in government administration. That however did not mean niggardliness. Care should be taken to assure the money was spent on development that would give the best return.

Regarding the selection of a Conservative candidate for this riding, and you haven't an official representative of the party here yet, the plan is to call a convention. It is important that everything should be done in an honest and clean way. The primaries should be beyond reproach or suspicion. As a result of those primaries, a candidate will be chosen at a central convention. No candidate should be refused an opportunity to go before the convention but, the candidate must abide by the rules of that convention. Let every-

body go to the convention and take his chance. The spirit of fairplay should prevail and defeated candidates should rally to the support of the one who may be elected. Only by a united party can we hope for success."

Dr. Tolmie urged good clean administration regardless of political policies and also stressed the need for the development of a Canadian national spirit.

The speaker concluded his address with a humorous story of experiences in England during his visit there some years ago in connection with the removal of the cattle embargo.
