CANADIAN PLANTS THRIVE IN ENGLAND

Over \$1,500 at Home of Former Governor Byng at Thorpe Hall

LONDON, May 10.—Over 1,500 different Canadian plants and shrubs have been planted at Thorpe Hall, near Clacton-on-Sea, where the ex-Governor-General of Canada, Viscount Byng, resides with Lady Byng. Since their return to Thorpe, Lady Byng has made wonderful changes in the grounds in front of the house. She is an enthusiastic gardener.

There is a large lake, where various Canadian waterfowl are rapidly making themselves at home. Not far away a noisy waterfall feeds two smaller lakes and stepping-stones, little islands and natural haunts make up a beautiful picture. Everywhere there are strange and peculiar plants, some taken from the Canadian prairies and dropped into quiet Essex soil; some sent by Canadian friends, and many brought by Lady Byng herself from Canada.

The much-talked-about swamp frogs have not arrived yet. They are coming from Ontario, and a nice swampy piece of ground awaits their arrival.

Walking among the trees one constantly sees nesting boxes conveniently placed.

CHANGE STATUS DOMINION DAY

Governor-General to Represent King and not British Cabinet

OTTAWA, May 10.—Changes in the position of the governor general as a medium of communication between the Canadian and British governments will probably be brought about on Dominion Day. The status of governor general was discussed at the last imperial conference and it was decided that the governor general in a dominion should be a representative of the crown and not a representative of the British government. The change will probably involve the appointment of a British commission to each dominion specially charged to present the views of the British government. But that is in the hands of the British government itself. So far, there is no indication that a commissioner is likely to be appointed at an early date.

The change in regard to the governor general approved by the imperial conference, was in regard to his status and functions and not in regard to his title.

CRADLE ROCKING IS TAUGHT IN ITALY

Flappers and Tomboys May Not Join Fascist Women's Organizations

ROME, May 10.—Teaching the science of cradle rocking is the principal function of the feminine Fascist organization which within three years has mustered 140,000 members. Flappers and tom-boys are barred from this "army of mothers" whose members are taught to do with their hands when babies wail instead of what to do with their feet when saxophones wail.

"Some of us are or will become mothers of children of our own," Signora Eliza Majer Rizzioli, leader of the women fascists, said, "but all of us must always be mothers to all of Italy's children, protecting them with skill in which natural knack blends with scientific efficiency."

The Fascist women's organization is divided into 1400 groups with a total membership of about 30,000 women and 60,000 girls. Each group is charged with providing the women of its district with ample means of education for motherhood and the care of babies.

NOT COME UNDER THE QUOTA LAW ENTERING THE UNITED STATES
