## Construction to be Started Next Month of New Sawmill at Seal Cove for Big Bay Cc.

Shortly after June 1 construction will be started on the Big Bay Lumber Co.'s new sawmill here on the site of the old Prince Rupert Spruce Mills at Seal Cove it is announced by George McAfee. manager of the Big Bay Lumber Co., who is in the city today from Georgetown. The work was to have started ere this time but certain unforeseen circumstances have caused delay. The company is now considering the erection of the buildings by contract instead of by labor as was originally intended. The buildings will go up during the summer, installation of machinery being scheduled for the fall.

Present plans call for the plant to be .-ready for operation by March 1 when the sawmill at Georgetown, which the company has operated for many years, will be closed down. The new mill will have a capacity of 40,000 feet or slightly more per single daily shift.

There will be three new buildingsawmill, planing mill and machine shop. The cld shed will be overhauled and reincdelled while the former Prince Rupert Spruce Mills steam plant will be used after it has been overhauled and a new smokestack has been put up.

Mr. McAfee will assume the active management of the new plant while Gilbert Campbell, identified previously here with the Emerson interests and the Prince Rupert Spruce Mills, will be chief engineer and machinist. Campbell is due here next month to be engaged in connection with the setting up of machinery and preparations there-The installation of the machinery will be supervised by C. E. Dorman of
