MACLEAN ENTHUSED BY CONFERENCE

McINTOSH PLANE BREAKS WING AND STALLED IN GALICIA

LAST HALIBUT AUCTION TODAY

Canadian Boats Now in and Few, if any, More Americans Are Expected

The last big halibut auction of the season is in progress at the local fish exchange this afternoon with 287,000 pounds being offered by nine American boats. It is understood that the last Canadian boat of the season has now landed its catch, there being none offering this morning. The following boats were not satisfied with bids offered this morning ranging from 10c and 11c to 12c and 7c and are going on the board again this afternoon. Sigs, 20,000 pounds; Resolute, 32,000; Northern, 35,000; Senator, 21,000; Attu, 45,000; Kanaga, 27,000; Albatross, 60,000; Wave, 9,000; Portlock, 32,000. It was reported this afternoon that the Albatross had accepted a bid of 10c and 6c from the Atlin Fisheries.

CANADIANS TO INVADE FRANCE

Will Celebrate Tenth Anniversary of Armistice Next Year in Paris

QUEBEC, Nov. 19.—Under command of Archdeacon Scott the Canadian Expeditionary Forces return to France next year the Archdeacon announced. The expedition this time will travel unaccompanied and in the guise of a Canadian fur-trading party will celebrate the tenth anniversary of the armistice in Paris. The party will be representative of the whole Dominion.

WAS BURNED AT EDMONTON

Woman Trapped at Her Own Front Door With Baby; Loses Life in Fire

EDMONTON, Nov. 19.—Trapped at the front door of her home this morning with her 18-month-old baby girl in her arms, Mrs. C. M. Tait, the well-known Edmonton photographer, was burned to death with her child, while her husband, thinking she was right behind him, carried the two older children down the back stairs.

EARTHQUAKE CALIFORNIA

SANTA MARIA, California, Nov. 19.—An earthquake was felt here last night. Several windows were cracked and a few chimneys weakened by the tremor of two weeks ago toppled and fell, the shock being felt at Lompoc and San Luis Obispo, where it is reported the quake was more severe than on November 4.

Two spectators were injured by their machine, one wing of which was broken. The machine was so badly damaged it was found impossible to repair it on the spot so the fliers went to Lwow, a city also known by the name of Lemberg.

Conference of Premiers was One of Most Momentous in History of Canada--McLean

VICTORIA, November 19.—The recent gathering of provincial representatives will produce rich results in every part of Canada, Premier MacLean told the Canadian Club at a luncheon in his honor here yesterday. The results would be felt in increasing understanding and a stronger national spirit. Readjustment of provincial problems and irritations by the conference had showed that Canada was thinking nationally as never before. All the provinces were willing to make concessions in order to help others. From these positive offers of co-operation he predicted the Canadian Government and Parliament would work out solutions for all Canadian problems.

In moulding a Canadian spirit and promoting development of a great country, the conference was one of the most momentous gatherings in the history of the Dominion, Premier MacLean stated.

Eby, assisted by Mrs. Kate Dudoward, conducted the services. The pall bearers were members of the church quarterly board, the stewards, the P.S.A.C., and the Y.P.E.A. Society. The floral tributes showed the esteem in which the deceased was held, these being received from the Choir, Miss L. Deacon, Miss Myles, the Y.P.E.A., the P.S.A.C., Mrs. P. H. KILLED WHEN STRUCK BY ELECTRIC FREIGHT

Girl Injured and Motorman Arrested and Charged with Manslaughter

VANCOUVER, Nov. 19.—Stanley Hillton, 23 years of age, was instantly killed this afternoon when his motor was struck by a B.C. Electric freight at Jubilee. Ellen Winter, 13 years of age, was injured when struck by the truck in front of the station platform. Motorman J. E. Campbell was arrested by the Burnaby police and charged with manslaughter.

FIVE CASES ON ASSIZE DOCKET

Two Criminal Actions, Two Civil and One Divorce to be Heard in Supreme Court Next Week

Five cases—two criminal, two civil and one divorce—have been set down for the fall session of the Supreme Court Assizes which will open in the city on Wednesday morning next. Mr. Justice W. A. MacDonald will preside and A. M. Johnson, K.C., will prosecute in the one murder case. The criminal cases will be as follows: Rex vs. Sankey, charged with murder. A. M. Johnson, K.C. prosecuting; J. Edward Bird, defending. Rex vs. Whitewash, attempted murder. L. W. Patmore defending.

In one civil action, Ernest Love will sue the International Electric Co. for breach of contract and damages. Patmore & Fulton have the case for the plaintiff and Williams, Manson & Gonzales for the defendant company. The action has to do with affairs pertaining to the electric light service at Stewart. The second civil case is that of Mrs. Dupuis of Haysport who is suing the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. for damages over the erection of a building on land which, though not known at first, subsequently turned out to be owned by the plaintiff. Patmore & Fulton have the case for the plaintiff and W. E. Fisher will appear for the defendant company.

The divorce case will be that of Tupper vs. Tupper in which Patmore & Fulton will represent the petitioner.

SHOT CONSTABLE AND WITNESSES IN BELLA COOLA CASE ARRIVE

Provincial Constable J. A. Williams of Bella Coola, with the attempted murder of whom Peter Whitewash, Indian, will be charged at the Supreme Court Assizes here next week, arrived in the city from down the coast on the Gardena this morning accompanied by six witnesses in the case, including Rev. P. E. Rendle, Indian missionary at Bella Coola. Other witnesses will arrive on the steamer Prince Rupert on Wednesday. It is alleged that Whitewash shot Constable Williams with a 25-35 caliber rifle when the latter was attempting to arrest him. The shot entered the officer's left hand which is still out of commission. The incident is alleged to have occurred in midsummer.

NORTHWEST PASSAGE OPEN THIS YEAR

VANCOUVER, Nov. 19.—The north-west passage through Franklin Straits and Peel Sound is open this year, according to Bishop I. O. Stringer of the Yukon, who is here en route to Toronto. The Eskimos estimated it would be another ten years before a similar opportunity to make the trip occurred.

GUilty AT VERNON OF ROBBERY WITH VIOLENCE

VERNON, Nov. 19.—Albert Esplin, accused of robbery with violence at Kelowna on October 18, was found guilty in the assize court by the jury and will be sentenced later.

FLYER RETURNED FROM ATTEMPT TO REACH NEW ZEALAND VIA HONOLULU
