CHARACTERIZED CARLOW STATE-MENT AS ABSOLUTE UN-FOUNDED AND UNTRUE

VICTORIA, April 26.-Before Mr. Justice Morrison's royal commission investigating the charges of Frank Carlow, Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, yesterday characterized as absolutely unfounded and untrue the statement by Carlow that he (Mr. Pattullo) had told him to split a commission of \$5,000, allegedly secured in a foreshore deal put through for L. G. Thomas of Vancouver, with M. B. Jackson.

Mr. Jackson corroborated the minister and denied that he had received or asked for any part of the commission.

Henry C. Hall, former M.L.A. denied he had entered into any agreement or bargain with Carlow whereby commissions Carlow secured as liquor agent were to be applied toward the organization expensese of the Liberal party.

Col. Winsby, former member of the Liquor Centrol Board, testified that neither he nor any members of the board had knowledge of the appointment of persons to positions with the board on the understanding that they were required to "give their services free, playing in the Liberal orchestra."

It is not expected that any grain will be left in storage here but the elevator will be ready to receive next fall's crop immediately it starts to move.
