SITUATION IN CHINA.

That the situation at Shanghai is critical goes without saying. If it is true that the safety of the international settlement now depends primarily on the foreign forces there, it is also true that the safety of the Chinese citizenry will be best assured if the Cantonese are prompt in capturing the city.

It is believed the foreign troops now in Shanghai are adequate to preserve order in the foreign section but if not there are thousands more approaching on ships a few days distant from the city. 


