LONG DISTANCE RECORD FOR "MUSHING" CLAIMED

Karl Bayley of Northern Manitoba travels 600 miles with catch of furs.

WINNIPEG, March 10.—A long distance "mushing record" has been set for Manitoba this season by Karl Bayley, a fur trader of the North country, who recently arrived in Winnipeg with a catch of furs.

Over a trail of six hundred miles, the trapper wended his way across the snow covered country from Sturgeon river to the Hudson Bay railway. He finished the last leg of his trip to Winnipeg by train, leaving his dogs at The Pas, Manitoba.

Nineteen days Mr. Bayley was on the trail, with his faithful dogs as sole companions. It was a gruelling test and part of the drive was made in blinding blizzards and extreme cold. Before daybreak each day, he and his five huskies were on the trail travelling till nightfall when he pitched camp. Trail rations, solid and easy to carry, were Mr. Bayley's food, while fish was caught for the dogs. The northern "musher" did not stay long in civilization. He disposed of his furs and after purchasing a few necessities for his distant camp, departed for The Pas, and is now racing for his outpost, which is about 180 miles from the Hudson Bay and 60 miles east of the Shamattawa river.

HIGH HONOR CONFERRED ON WINNIPEG PRIEST

Father Morton of Prairie City is Made Protostatory Apostolic by Pope Pius

WINNIPEG, March 10.—(By Canadian Press)—The title of protostatory apostolic, has been conferred by Pope Pius XI, upon Rev. Dr. T. W. Merton, parish priest of St. Mary's Catholic church in Winnipeg. This is the highest honor granted to the clergy by His Holiness.

The papal brief, which was received by Archbishop Sinnott, said that the distinction was granted in recognition of Father Morton's faithful service over a long period and for the high recognition which his learning and ability has brought among Catholics and non-Catholics.
