Mrs. E. M. Urell and family, who have been spending the summer here with Mr. Urell who is engaged in fish buying for United States interests, will sail this evening on the Prince Rupert for their home in Astoria, Oregon.
The exodus of Indians and Orientals from the Naas and Skeena River canneries has commenced. The steamer Cardena, which was in port at noon today, had a representative crowd for Vancouver numbering one hundred and more.
Union steamer Cardena, Capt. A. Johnston, returned to port at 11.30 this morning from the Naas River, sailing during the noon hour for Vancouver. Those leaving here for Vancouver on the vessel included F. T. Patterson, Miss Darwin, Miss Durant and W. A. Lawson.
C.P.R. steamer Princess Beatrice, Capt. S. K. Gray, arrived in port at 8.30 this morning from the south and sailed at 11 o'clock on her return to Vancouver and waypoints. Some twelve passengers disembarked here from the vessel and there were also a few round trip tourists aboard.
Fire Chief Ringer of Minneapolis, accompanied by his wife and family, and Fire Chief Cody of San Francisco, were southbound passengers on the Princess Alice this morning after having made the trip to Alaska. They were met and shown around the city by D. H. McDonald, local fire chief.
Motorship Bellingham, Capt. J. E. Anderson, arrived in port at 6.30 this morning from Ketchikan with a cargo consisting of 110 tierces of mild-cured salmon, two carloads of halibut and 909 cases of canned salmon for transshipment to the United States over the Canadian National Railways.
Having been delayed six and a half hours by fog in the neighborhood of Kletnu, C.N.R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. D. Donald, arrived in port last night at 5 o'clock from Vancouver. Powell River and Ocean Falls, sailing at 8 for Stewart and Anyox. The vessel brought north a full list of some 200 passengers, about 120 of whom boarded the waiting train here and proceeded East. The vessel will return to port and sail for the south this evening.

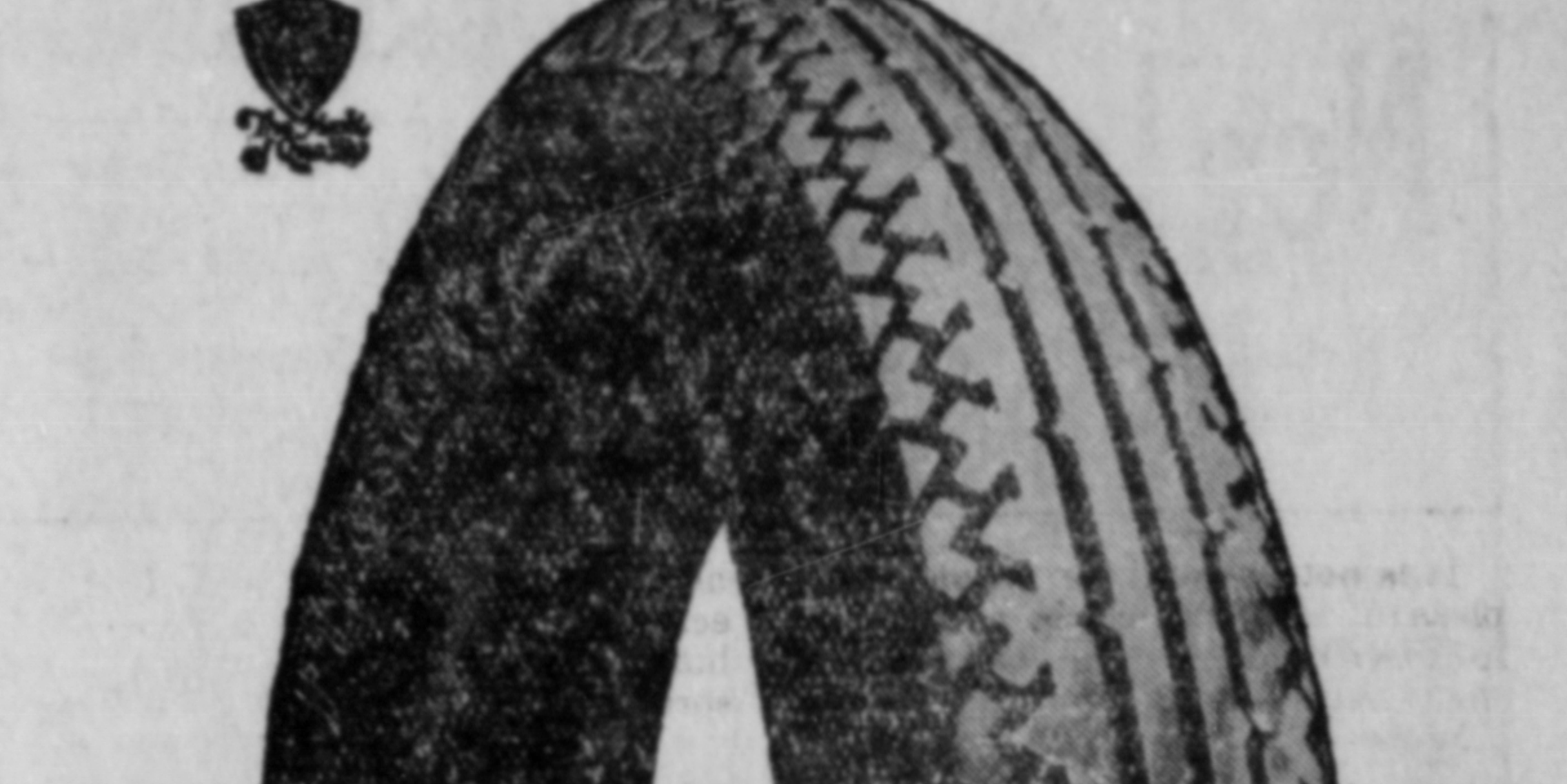

WATER NOTICE DIVERSION AND USE. 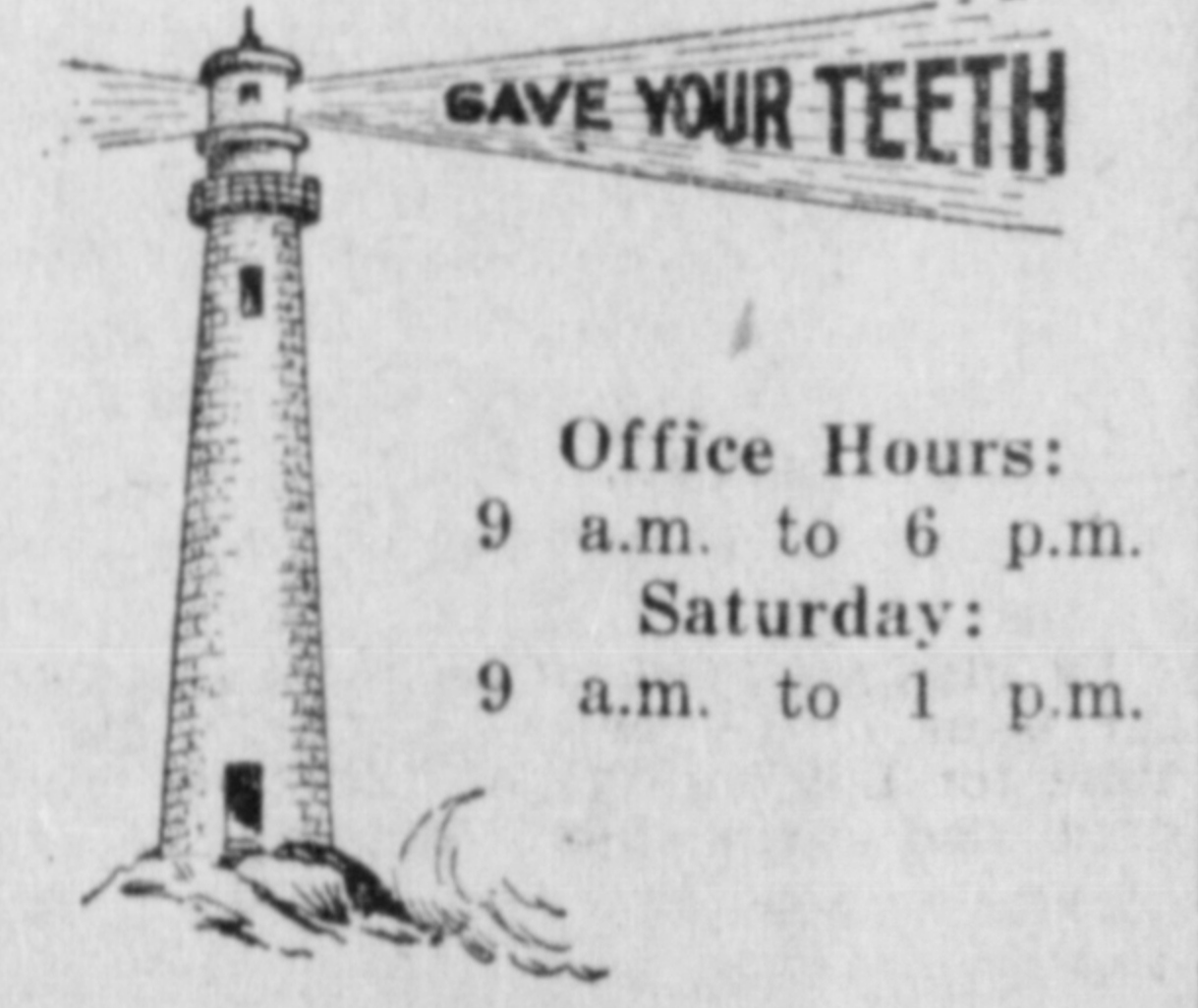
