ARE IN INTENSIVE RACE TO BE FIRST TO ACHIEVE 200 MILES AN HOUR LONDON, March 17. - Europe's four

great speed monsters are in an intensive race for the honor of being the first to achieve 200 miles-an-hour.

One of them, the 1,000-horse power Sunbeam mystery car, has challenged all American records and some time this month will attempt to undergo a speed, on the beach of Daytona, Florida, that may either end disastrously or in the greatest event in automobile his-

Another, the 12-cylinder, 450-horsepower "Bluebird" of Capt. Malcolm Campbell, is being groomed for a 200mile clip on the beach at Pendine, England. It is an experimental machine which required two and a half years to construct.

Parry Thomas, British racer who recently captured the world's record by achieving 172 miles-an-hour on the Pendine sands with his 26-litre, Liberty engine "Baba" is out to add 28 mile to his record before someone beats him to it.

Two hundred miles an hour is a new high objective in speed for an automobile. The mechanical preparations for such an attempt must be perfect. There is no margin of safety for errors. It takes approximately four-tenths of a second for a driver's hand, to act on a message from his brain. At a 200-mile clip his automobile would travel 40 yards during this time.

FORMIDABLE CONTENDER

Of all the contenders, the Sunbeam mystery car is the most foremost in appearance. It is painted red and looks like a huge aluminum cigar on wheels. It is 32 feet long and six feet wide. Driving power is furnished by two 500horsepower motors located over the front and rear axles, respectively, capable, the designer says, of developing 220 miles an hour. They consume four and a half gallons of gasoline a minute. The machine weighs 7,056 pounds and cost \$100,000 to build.

# GLOOMY DEAN

THAT'S WHY HE WRITES FOR NEWS-PAPERS, SAYS INGE

His house consisted of 30 rooms, much hospitality was expected of him, and trying to keep up his end of affairs generally, on his deanery income, he said were things which had no tendency to eliminate the word "Gloomy" from the handle which had been tacked onto his name.


